### **Visiting Hours**

- Male Visiting hours are Monday, Friday and Saturday from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Thursdays from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., and Sundays - 12:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m.
- Female Visiting hours are Thursdays from 12:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m., and Sundays from 8:30 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.
- Allen Oakwood Correctional Institution maintains video visiting kiosks in every general population housing unit in addition to protective custody and residential treatment units. The hours of availability for video visits are as follows: 7:30 AM – 10:30AM; 12:30PM – 3:30PM; and 5:00PM – 8:00PM. Visits are 30 minutes in duration; however, an additional 30 minutes can be requested if there is no one scheduled at the same kiosk immediately after the conclusion of the initial video visit.
- Approved visitors must create an account and register with JPay. When family members register to have a video visit, they are prompted by JPay through a series of steps to achieve their visit. Video visits must be scheduled at least 24 hours in advance of the time that they are requesting.

### Unique Program

- Vocational Horticulture and Turf/ Landscape Management: This is a 600-hour educational program that takes approximately 6 to 8 months to complete and obtain certificate. The students have the opportunity to prepare for and take the Landscape, Grower and Garden Center Ohio Certified Nursery Technician exams that are offered through the Ohio Nursery and Landscape Association. Students that pass one or more of these exams are issued a two-year interim certification. They may apply for permanent certification if they obtain employment in the green industry. This BeCI vocational program entails classroom work and is community service approved which permits the students direct on the job training while servicing the community. The offender has the opportunity to meet with community partners, listen to their needs, apply their knowledge, make recommendations, supply a material list and complete the project.

- Visiting hours are Sunday through Saturday with Morning sessions from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., and Afternoon sessions from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.
- Video Visiting hours are Sunday through Saturday with Morning sessions from 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m., Afternoon sessions from 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., and Evening sessions from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.
- Reservations must be made in advance, but no more than 14 days in advance.

### **Unique Programs**

- Therapeutic Community: In January of 2014, CCI was selected to house a Therapeutic Community dorm. Currently twelve offenders have been selected as the core group in the unit and are being trained by staff to help more offenders that will be housed in the unit. The TC program centers around the community as a primary agent of change and a second fundamental TC principle is "self-help." This implies the individuals in the program are the main contributors to the change process. TC participants are expected to become role models who actively reflect the values and teachings of the community. Ordered routine activities are intended to counter the characteristically disordered lives of these residents and teach them how to plan, set, and achieve goals and be accountable.
- D.A.S.H. Animal Rescue: July 2017, CCI partnered with D.A.S.H Animal Rescue. Danielle's Animal Safe Haven started helping lost and homeless animals over 25 years ago. The program has rescued thousands of animals over the years ranging from hamsters to horses by placing them in forever homes. All the animals are checked by a veterinarian, vaccinated and spayed/neutered. The program is credited with saving over 100 dogs with parvovirus and saving hundreds of cats and dogs from euthanasia at shelters all over the United States. While donations are appreciated, this program raises many funds by conducting yard/bake sales and several adoption events throughout the year. ▪ **Inmate Reintegration Unit:** The Chillicothe Correctional Institution (CCI) and Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction provide reentry programming for offenders. CCI opened a Reintegration dorm that was specifically designed to meet the offenders programming needs. This unit was designed as the last step for inmates to gain skills that will equip them to become productive members of society. The Reintegration Unit is based on a pro-social model of integrating.

- Due to covid-19 guidelines the following cannot currently receive visitation: Reception, Disciplinary/Local Control, and Protective Custody/ Security Control.
- General Population Inmates may receive morning visitation on Saturday and Sunday from 8:30a.m. to 11:00a.m.
- General Population Inmates may receive afternoon visitation Saturday and Sunday from 12:00p.m. to 2:30p.m.
- Mental Health RTU offenders may receive visitation on Friday mornings 8:30a.m. to 11:00a.m.
- Mental Health RTU offenders may receive visitation on Saturday afternoons 12:00p.m. to 2:30p.m.
- Visitors must be processed in no later than 8:00 a.m. for morning visiting sessions and 11:30 a.m. for afternoon visiting sessions.

Video visitation are 30minutes in duration, and an additional 30 minutes can be scheduled immediately after if there is no one else scheduled.

### Unique Programs

- The Ohio Benefit Bank (OBB): is a public-private partnership that helps connect low- and moderate-income Ohioans with free tax preparation and access to potential public benefits and work supports. In May 2008, CRC began providing services to those offenders who have 30 days or less to serve in our system. In partnership with the Governor's Office of Faith-Based and Community Initiatives (GOFBCI) and the Ohio Association of Second Harvest Food Banks, The OBB encourages eligible Ohioans to claim tax credits, such as the Earned Income Tax Credit and public benefits such as food stamps, child care subsidies, home energy assistance and children's health care insurance, by helping them prepare and file applications. Volunteer Benefit Bank counselors are available to help determine eligibility and complete applications for inmates and their families.
- Reading Room: The reading rooms encourage family literacy by providing a pleasant and comfortable setting for both child and incarcerated parent. Each room is stocked with a wide variety of children's books and has an inmate narrator who reads to the visiting children twice a day. The role of the inmate narrator is to read picture books to the children in much the same manner that children's hour would be done at a public library. A variety of arts and craft supplies for the children are also available in most of the rooms. Many of the supplies and books are donated by employees and service organizations.

- Zone A Inmates will be allowed a maximum of 4 visits per month. Each inmate's approved visitor will be allowed to schedule only two visits per month (once the maximum of 4 is reached, no other visits will be scheduled for the month). Cancellation of visits must be done within 72 hours prior to the scheduled visit. Two (2) no shows for scheduled visits will result in forfeiture of scheduling for 30 days. All scheduled visits will count as one visit toward the 4 monthly visits (all day visits will count as two (2) visits).
- Zone A Female visitation hours are Sunday 7:00a.m. to 10:00a.m., Tuesday 7:00a.m. to 10:00a.m., 11:00a.m. to 2:00p.m., and 6:00p.m. to 8:00p.m., Thursday 7:00a.m. to 10:00a.m., 11:00a.m. to 2:00p.m., and 6:00p.m. to 8:00p.m., Friday 11:00a.m. to 2:00p.m., and Saturday 7:00a.m. to 11:00a.m., and 11:00a.m. to 2:00p.m.

- Three Medical Units: Three Medical Units provide inpatient medical services to inmate-patients in need of intensive skilled medical and nursing care. Two units house patients with short-term needs. The third unit provides specialized care for those patients with significant long-term medical needs and/or with significant physical disabilities.
- The CARE: The CARE (Creating A Responsive Environment for the Terminally Ill) program provides palliative and holistic end-of-life care for inmates suffering from advanced terminal illness. A multidisciplinary team addresses the medical, mental health, spiritual and daily assistance needs of each inmate-patient. The involvement of family members and Stephen Ministry community volunteers and inmate companions also support the program's goal of providing the inmate the opportunity to die with dignity.
- The Family Reunification Program: The Family Reunification Programs encompasses various special events that are designed to strengthen family bonds behind and beyond the bars to include annual Mother's and Father's Day dinners, Family Night, Inside Outside Dads, and Love One of Prisoners (LOOP).

▪**Stephen Ministries:** Stephen Ministry is a program that affords trained volunteers and offenders to serve as compassionate caregivers to terminally ill patients housed in the C.A.R.E. (Creating A Responsive Environment for the Terminally Ill) Unit locate on 2 North. Stephen Ministry is a place where people with special gifts for the caring ministry can use those gifts to bring support and comfort to those in need with the goal of no one having to transition alone.

- Video visitation is available in both Grafton Correctional Institution and Grafton Reintegration Center for general population housing units. Video visits are available from 7:30 A.M. to 10:30A.M., 12:30P.M. to 3:30P.M., and 5:30P.M. to 8:30P.M.
- Video visitation are 30 minutes in duration; however, and additional 30 minutes may be requested if there is no one scheduled at the same kiosk immediately after the conclusion of your video call. Video calls must be scheduled at least 24 hours in advance.

### **Unique Programs**

- Specialized Housing and Programs: GCI offers several specialized housing units and programs. The Veterans Unit offers programming in leadership, comradery, and community service. The Faith-Based Unit offers men of diverse religious background programming and meaningful unit-based activities surrounding faith and spirituality. Grafton Reintegration Center is a three-dorm center that offers low level offender the opportunity to experience many programs and meaningful activities prior to release.
- Sustainability Initiatives and Programs: GCI is focused on energy efficiency, waste reduction and relatable programming. GCI has a recycling program and Roots of Success Reentry Programming at GCI and GRC to share the importance of environmental literacy to the population. GCI has entered in a partnership with ODOT to keep roadways free of litter. In addition, we use waterless urinals, LED lighting, highly efficient boilers and gasless mowers to lower our energy and resource usage.
- Sex Offender Programming: Located at GCI, this extensive residential program is designed to address the behavioral needs of high-risk sex offenders.
- Steppingstone Therapeutic Community: Located at the GRC, this recovery-based program promotes treatment through a community approach: Residential program, 12-18 months, 8 hours of program engagement, and Community as a method model.
- The HOPE Center: Established for the residents of the Grafton Reintegration Center to learn and grow from programming. It is imperative that programming be provided for the residents that are returning back into society so that they can be equipped with the proper knowledge and tools in order to reduce recidivism. There are many opportunities for the residents to become knowledgeable in viable work skills.
- CDL Program: This 4-week program allows offenders the opportunity to receive their Class A Commercial Driver's License. Upon completion and obtaining CDL, an employment interview will be scheduled.

- Edwin's Program:** This culinary arts program is run by the founder of Edwin's Leadership and Restaurant Institute. This year long program offers all aspects of the restaurant business along with possible employment upon release.
- Inmate Groups:** The following approved inmate groups have been established to provide programming, community service and meaningful activities to our population. They donate to organizations that they are affiliated along local reentry organization in our community. These groups also promote prosocial activities within the facility and sponsor family events on a regular basis.

Approved visitors can make a reservation as early as thirty (30) days in advance but no less than seven (7) days prior to a visit. Inmates in the Transitional Program Unit (TPU) under Disciplinary Control are permitted one (1) visit with approved visitors each month for one hour each and with no more than two (2) visitors at a time. Inmates in TPU under Security Control are permitted two (2) visits with approved visitors each month for one hour each, and with no more than two (2) visitors at a time. If a visit is cancelled *less than* seven days before it is scheduled, it will still count toward the number of visits the inmate is allowed per month. Visits denied or terminated for violation of the rules of the visitation policy will also count toward the inmate's allowable number of visits in that month.
- Inmates in Limited Privilege Housing (LPH) are permitted four (4) visits a month with approved visitors, with no more than three (3) visitors at a time.

- Inmates in General Population are permitted two (2) visits with approved visitors each month, with a maximum of five (5) visitors at a time. Inmates in the Honor Dorm are permitted four (4) visits with approved visitors each month, with a maximum of five (5) visitors at a time.
- The hours of availability for video visits are as follows: Noon to 3:00 pm. Visits are 30 minutes in duration; however, an additional 30 minutes can be requested if there is no one scheduled at the same kiosk immediately after the conclusion of the initial video visit. ### **Unique Programs**

- Computer Aided Drafting (CAD) Program: This is a one-year program and covers two drafting areas. In Mechanical Drafting, students start by drawing simple two-dimensional drawings working toward orthographic projection in assembly drawings with paper and pencil. Students then start using the computer. The first program they use is AutoCAD to learn the basics of CAD. Then the students start using the Inventor and from there they move onto three-dimensional solid modeling. In Architectural Drafting, students start by drawing pole barns, sheds, and simple houses using paper and pencil and then start using the computer. The first program they use is AutoCAD. Then the students can move onto three-dimensional house design using Revit. Over the course of the program there are several opportunities for the students to participate in community service projects. The class has drawn houses for Habitat for Humanity, designed skate parks, benches, trash containers, picnic tables and signs for local communities. It helps the students feel better about themselves by giving back to the community.
- LaeCI Reentry Center: Lake Erie Correctional Institution has a dedicated Reentry Center to help meet the needs of inmates that are returning back to society. The Reentry Center is continuously updating information, programs and knowledge about what is happening in the local communities and organizations to bring awareness for inmates before leaving the institution.
- Edwin's Culinary Club: Edwin's has teamed up with the Reentry Center and is educating dedicated inmates about the world of Culinary Arts. It can also be used as a step to success!
- The HOPE Center: The Ridge Project is a non-profit organization that offers the following: Tyro Dads: Eighteen week program developed to address unique obstacles faced by families when the father/husband is incarcerated; Tyro-nomics: Educates participants about being financially sound in order to succeed; Tyro Jet: Job ethics class that prepares individuals for the workplace and focuses on job ethics.
- Lake Affect Media Studio The Lake Affect Media Studio at LaeCI is a full functioning media studio where shows are produced, edited, and then completed for viewing on the ODRC Hope Channel. The Media Team is learning valuable and transferable skills about the filmmaking process. - General Population visiting hours on weekdays are afternoon sessions 12:30p.m. to 3:30p.m., and evening sessions 4:30p.m. to 7:30p.m. with a one-hour grace period.
- General Population visiting hours on weekends are morning sessions 8:30a.m. to 11:30a.m., and afternoon sessions from 12:30p.m. to 3:30p.m. with a one-hour grace period.
- General population inmates are permitted visits based on their institutional number. Inmates whose institutional number ends in an odd number are permitted visitation on odd numbered calendar days. Inmates whose institutional number ends in an even number are permitted visitation on even numbered calendar days.
- Visiting is limited to a maximum of three approved (3) visitors per inmate at one time, including walking children, unless special arrangements have been made in advance.
- All visitors under eighteen (18) years of age must be related to the offender being visited or accompanied by an approved visitor who is the child's parent, legal guardian or guardian. Documentation naming the child's custodial parent or guardian must be presented in the form of a birth certificate or custodial court order prior to the visit.
- In cases where an offender's child visits and a custodial parent or legal guardian does not accompany the child, a notarized Authorization for Minor Child Visitation Form (DRC4371) must be provided, specifying the name(s) of the guardian(s) listed on the approved visiting list who may bring the child to visit and permission for the child to be photographed and searched.
- Each visiting session counts as a separate visit.
- Visitors travelling greater than 200 miles one way may request two (2) visits on the same day. The visits shall count as the two (2) visits allowed per inmate each month.
- Inmates housed in General Population and Security Control status will be permitted weekend visits, while inmates in Disciplinary Control Status are not authorized for weekend visitation

Visiting reservations are required for all visiting sessions. Reservation requests will be accepted no less than 72 hours and no more than 30 days in advance of visit.

- video visitation is available seven (7) days weekly, from 7:30-10:30 AM, 12:00-3:00 PM, and 5:30-8:30 PM. Visits are thirty (30) minutes in duration, but an additional thirty minutes can be scheduled if the kiosk is not scheduled immediately after your scheduled video visit. Video visitation reservations must be made twenty-four (24) hours in advance and are subject to first-come, first-serve availability.
- Video visitation kiosks are available to all general population inmates in their housing units. Inmates in restrictive housing (segregation) are not permitted video visits.

## **Unique Programs**

- Reading Room:** The reading room at LeCI is stocked with a wide variety of children's books. The child and guardian may select a book from the reading room to take back to their designated visiting table. We encourage the incarcerated parent to take the selected book and read to child. The opportunity to read to a child can build a bond and it can also help to foster a lifelong love of books.
- Real Men Crochet:** The Real Men Crochet Program started in March 2008. The two-phase program provides inmates with the basic art of crocheting and then gives them the opportunity to donate works to area nonprofit groups, making community service an integral part of re-entry. Inmates have made attractive scarves and hats for the local homeless shelter. The men have also made beautiful afghans that were donated to the Veterans Administration (VA) Hospital in Dayton, Ohio. In addition, inmates have started crocheting sweaters for Guideposts for Kids. These sweaters will be sent overseas and throughout the United States. Presently, there are 20 inmates that are crocheting in this program and the waiting list continues to grow. So far, 57 scarves and hats have been sent to a homeless shelter in Dayton, Ohio. A total of 16 afghans were sent to the VA hospital in Dayton, Ohio. In addition, three (3) United States flag afghans are completed; one (1) Ohio State flag afghan, and 63 hats and scarves are ready to be dropped off. All of the materials for this program are donated by the public.
- Sew Much Comfort:** The Sew Much Comfort Program helps provide adaptive clothing for wounded service members from all branches of the military and National Guard. T-shirts, polo shirts, sweatpants, and underwear are altered by opening seams and attaching Velcro closures where needed. Another facet of this program allows inmates to make cloth hospital bedrail bags and wheelchair bags which can be used for many purposes. These items are sent to U.S. Army bases all over the world. Lebanon Correctional started the program in November 2006 and we have shipped 630 bags.

### Unique Program

- Renaissance Program: The Renaissance Program is a seven-week program of healing restoration and learning how to support inmate loved ones upon Reentry back into the community. It represents the flagship of the various programs offered by LoCI's Recovery Services Department. The program emphasizes honesty, ethical living, and responsibility as part of a new life abstinent from alcohol and other drugs. Armed with strategies to face the challenges of reentry and their post-release lives, Renaissance graduates exit prison far better prepared to become useful citizens and heads-of-households.
- New Beginnings Unit: The New Beginnings Unit is a Community Service, Restorative Justice, Interfaith program. Inmates will have the opportunity to give back to society by providing community service and participating in programming that will assist with gaining a better understanding of the impact their crimes had on their victims and to help inmates restore relationships. This program also gives inmate the opportunity to enhance their spirituality by living in an interfaith community. Inmates will be able to develop a sense of awareness for other faiths and religions and gain a more sensitive point of understanding for their own faith.
- Horizon Program: The Horizon Program is an interfaith dormitory program where participants undergo a faith and character transformation by living in family units and utilizing social skill training, spiritual growth initiatives, and weekly visits with outside community mentors. Horizon builds supportive connections between London Correctional Institution and community volunteers to reduce recidivism rates thus creating safer communities. Horizon's objectives are: increase personal responsibility, increase family responsibility with programs to strengthen relations, enhance employability through improved life skills and mentoring, develop cooperation and citizenship through weekly group and community meetings, increase religious and social tolerance by training from qualified faith and community volunteers.

### **Unique Programs**

- Bee Keeping : Lorain Correctional Institution's newest program and inmate group is our Bee Keeping Program. In an effort to increase cadre programming with a focus on green initiatives, Lorain adopted a well-received Beekeeping Program in November of 2012. 100,000 bees were installed into hives in April 2013 and by the end of the year that number grew to over 1 million bees. Classes are held once a week for two hours and cover honeybee biology, equipment and hive maintenance, pollination, and queen rearing, as well as entertaining guest speakers from the surrounding beekeeping community. All of the hives were designed and constructed by the inmates in the program. The pollination benefits of having bees at this facility will positively affect the surrounding community within a five mile radius. A small harvest was experienced (as expected during the first year), however during the coming years we plan to donate honey to the surrounding food banks and local shelters. An added benefit to this program is the writing and editorial skills inmates gain by creating a monthly newsletter. Beekeeping skills are skills that are marketable in the community.
- Incarcerated Adult Groups: Supreme Valley Jaycees – The Supreme Valley Jaycee are an affiliate of the Ohio Jaycees. This group gives young people between the ages of 21 and 39 the tools they need to build the bridges of success for themselves in the areas of business development, management skills, individual training, community service, and international connections. The group benefits its membership and the general population with leadership, job skills and apprenticeship training and programming. They donate to various organization throughout the year and promote prosocial activities within the facility and sponsor family events on a regular basis.

### **Unique Programs**

- OPI: Ohio Penal Industries has two productive shops located at the Mansfield Correctional Institution. The Box Factory, originally established at the Lima Correctional Institution in 1984, was relocated to Mansfield in April 2004. This factory produces cardboard boxes for various state agencies. Two of the most popular items are Record Storage cartons and Meat Processing Career Center cartons. The factory currently employs 30 inmates. The YUSA Shop cleans and deflashes parts used by Honda. This shop provides employment for 150 inmates. Inmates are assimilated to a real work environment as they must fill out an application and be interviewed. Once hired, they receive an hourly wage and can be promoted with wage increases. Inmates are required to punch a time clock and maintain certain criteria to maintain employment.

- **Tender Loving Care:** The Tender Loving Dog Care Program, which began in 1998 in partnership with the Ashland County Humane Society, was set up so that dogs, which would have previously euthanized, could be brought into the institution and taught basic skills such as housebreaking and social skills. These dogs are trained by inmate handlers and ultimately are adopted by the public - to include staff and inmate's families. Since the start of the program, inmates have been affected quite positively. The dogs have helped to create a much calmer environment throughout the prison. Presently over 500 dogs have been trained and adopted to good, caring homes. On average, the T.L.D.C. program carries 20 to 25 dogs to be cared for and trained at one given time. The program adopts dogs out at a fee of \$125 per dog. These funds are used to go toward veterinarian bills, shots/medication, food, shelter, leashes, collars, and toys.
- **Inmate Reintegration Unit:** The Chillicothe Correctional Institution (CCI) and Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction provide reentry programming for offenders. CCI opened a Reintegration dorm that was specifically designed to meet the offenders programming needs. This unit was designed as the last step for inmates to gain skills that will equip them to become productive members of society. The Reintegration Unit is based on a pro-social model of integrating institutional and community resources to facilitate re-entry and reduce recidivism.

### Unique Programs

- Cage Your Room: Cage Your Rage program focuses on helping the offenders with anger issues stemming from life circumstances. The offenders are taught coping skills, thinking skills, and how to think before they react.
- Faith Based Reintegration: The Faith Based Reintegration Program concentrates on the offenders, their family members, sponsors, and mentors. The program is facilitated by NERC staff and local religious volunteers. The program provides 3 semesters of programming centered on the spiritual, emotional, family, and social needs for the offender. The program participants will complete 3 programs per semester, attend 2 religious services per week, and develop a 3-year reentry plan. Throughout the year program participants have the opportunity to unite with their family in family worship gatherings, fine arts celebrations, and academic graduations.
- Military Preparation: The Military Program is about structure, discipline, and stability. Leadership and teamwork also play a vital role in the program. The drills and physical training keep the mind and body fit and healthy. By instilling core values, it helps the recruits be respectful of peers and staff. They are taught leadership skills that apply to their daily lives. The offenders learn to develop courage to overcome any obstacles including the obstacle that brought them to prison.
- Money Smarts: The Money Smarts program is a class about the “basics” involved in money management. Participants will learn how to budget expenses and money; ways to decrease spending/increase income; the importance in saving money, how to choose a credit card, how to responsibly use a credit card and how to obtain a credit to build or repair poor credit.
- Mosaic: The Mosaic Program is an innovative therapeutic residential trauma treatment program designed to help women make connections between their traumatic and abusive histories, their addiction and incarceration. The program model encompasses empirically validated and gender responsive approaches to treatment. Mosaic is partially funded by a grant from the Bureau of Justice Assistance in cooperation with Recovery Resources, a full-service community mental health/addiction treatment agency in Cleveland.
- Responsible Family: The Responsible Family Life Skills program focuses on several different components. The components are as follows: getting to know yourself, communication, sharing and interaction, the impact of crime, community justice, repairing family community, adolescence and pop culture influence, taking responsibility, dynamics of family and culture, and morality.
- Root of Success: The Roots of Success program is an empowering environmental literacy and job readiness curriculum for corrections and re-entry programs. This program helps institutions achieve their sustainability goals and prepare offenders for employment opportunities in the green economy upon re-entry into society.
- Thinking For Change: The Thinking for Change program is an integrated cognitive behavioral change for offenders that includes cognitive restructuring, social skills development, and development of problem-solving skills. It's a continuum of interventions to address the cognitive, social and emotional needs of the offender population.

- **Victims Awareness:** The Victim Awareness Program is designed to allow offenders to participate in and learn the effects of crime on victims. The program includes activities such as thought-provoking homework assignments and an opportunity to speak directly with victims of crime and ask the questions of how crime has affected their lives. During this intensive program we explore facets ranging from various crime aspects, thinking errors and apology letter to the female cultural barriers, media and community impacts.
- **Moving on:** Moving On is an intervention program specifically for women who are involved with the criminal justice system. The overarching goal of this program is to assist women in mobilizing and developing personal and social resources to reduce the risk of future criminal behavior. This program can be offered on an individual or group basis to women who are detained or living in the community. Moving On ascribes to two philosophical and overlapping tenets. First, Moving On is a gender-responsive program that is based on theory and research concerned with women. Second, the program aims not only at reducing criminal behavior but also increasing the health and well-being of women, their families, and the community.
- **Chopping for Change (C4C):** Chopping for Change (C4C) is an innovative collaboration with Lutheran Metropolitan Ministries (LMM) that provides pre-release training and behavioral health services to NERC residents. C4C includes several programming phases such as parenting classes, life skills, Alcohol and Other Drug treatment and LMM's full culinary training program where participants gain practice in LMM's commercial kitchen and access counseling and case management. This groundbreaking model is effective because it provides meaningful work experience and training for incarcerated women that empower them to rejoin the labor force. It also minimizes the shock of reintegration after release by creating a graduated reintegration process with the appropriate levels of security, support, and services. C4C also enables incarcerated women from across the state to return home equipped with valuable personal and professional skills which will position them for success at the time of their release, ease their re-entry experience, and decrease recidivism.
- **Strong:** The STRONG Recovery Community is a new unit specifically designed for the needs of offenders that suffer from addiction. The STRONG Unit is defined by Sobriety, Transformation, Recovery, Optimism, New Beginnings, and Gratitude. The premise of the unit is to focus on addiction, sobriety, recovery and behavior modification. This recovery unit is the cornerstone for offenders who desire to transform their lives prior to their release. It gives offenders the opportunity to develop a healthy way of living suitable for society and to begin living a life of sobriety with positive influences and resources to assist them in their transition back to the community.
- **TOPUCU:** One of the newer programs at NERC is the TOPUCU Program. The Only Person "U" Cheat is "U". TOPUCU is a program designed to transform your thinking and actions. Consider it a training camp for the mind. In the area of personal development/SEL it makes what seems complex- understandable. And, what seems insurmountable - obtainable. The program offers Seven Lessons for transformation. It's based on the secrets that successful people have been using for years - athletes, entertainers, CEOs, innovators and pioneers around the globe.

### **Unique Programs**

- Short Term Offender Unit: The Short-Term Offender Unit is designed to service offenders that are newly received into the prison that are serving sentences of 90 days or less. The curriculum for the program was designed to enable the offenders by providing suitable programming that is accelerated to enhance their reentry back into the community. Daily classes on Life Skills, Coping Strategies, Family Services, Health and Wellness, Recovery Issues, Job Readiness, Dressing for Success, Finance Management and other topics make up this comprehensive curriculum for the Short Term Offender program and address the 8 Reentry Domains of education, employment, marital and family , associates and social interaction, substance abuse, community functioning, personal and emotional and attitude.
- Therapeutic Community: The Therapeutic Community (TC) are long-term (6-12 months) residential Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) treatment programs. The TC approach views AOD abuse as a reflection of chronic deficits in social, vocational, familial, economic, and personality development. The aim of the Therapeutic Community is to promote pro-social behavior, attitudes, and values as a method to attain abstinence from alcohol and other drugs and eliminate antisocial behaviors. The TC's at ORW and Pickaway are collaborative efforts between the Ohio DR&C and the Ohio Department of Alcohol and Drug Addiction Services.
- Inmate Reintegration Unit: The Chillicothe Correctional Institution (CCI) and Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction provide reentry programming for offenders. CCI opened a Reintegration dorm that was specifically designed to meet the offenders programming needs. This unit was designed as the last step for inmates to gain skills that will equip them to become productive members of society. The Reintegration Unit is based on a pro-social model of integrating institutional and community resources to facilitate re-entry and reduce recidivism.
- Mom and Kids Day: The Ohio Reformatory for Women strives to promote family bonding in preparation for family reunification, with this in mind special family-oriented events are scheduled twice a year. A Mom and Me Day Camp is scheduled during the summer months and a Mom and Kids Day Holiday event is scheduled in December. These events allow families to come into the institution to spend a day with their loved one with a variety of events, entertainment food and fun. Information is provided in the living units detailing the selection process for these events.
- Horizon Program: The Horizon Program is an multifaith residential program where participants undergo a faith and character transformation by living in family units and utilizing social skill training, spiritual growth initiatives, and weekly visits with outside community mentors. Horizon builds supportive connections between the Ohio Reformatory for Women and community volunteers to reduce recidivism rates thus

creating safer communities. Horizon's objectives are increase personal responsibility, increase family responsibility with programs to strengthen relations, enhance employability through improved life skills and mentoring, develop cooperation and citizenship through weekly group and community meetings, increase religious and social tolerance by training from qualified faith and community volunteers.

- Achieving Baby Care Success: Child development experts have determined that infants must bond with their mother in the first few months of life, or their emotional and intellectual functioning is impaired. In June 2001, ORW opened Ohio's only nursery program within an institution. The Achieving Baby Care Success (ABC'S) Program allows incarcerated pregnant inmates to maintain custody of their infants after they are born. Each participant has an individualized treatment plan so that the problems that resulted in her incarceration are thoroughly addressed. Hands-on parenting instruction is available for every mother in the program. Eligible mothers for the program are screened and must be serving a short-term sentence for a non-violent crime. The criterion for the program ensures that the mothers and infants leave the institution together. There are currently 8 babies in the nursery.

### Unique Programs

- Accepting Responsibility: This program helps inmates explore the "justification thinking errors" and addresses accepting responsibility for destructive behaviors.
- Fear The Anger Trigger: Encourages family literacy by providing a pleasant and comfortable setting for both child and incarcerated parent. Each room provides a comfortable, pleasant room for both child and incarcerated parent.
- OSP Wellness: Medical, Unit Staff, Recovery Services, Mental Health and Recreation provide education on topics related to maintaining a healthy lifestyle. Activities are structured to motivate inmates to be responsible for their well-being physically, mentally, and emotionally. Educational activities are provided on a weekly basis for six months.
- The Only Person You Cheat is Yourself (TOPUCU): a program designed to transform your thinking and actions. TOPUCU is a transformational program designed to develop finishers. This program anticipates the challenges you may face for each stage of progress such as breaking bad habits, setting goals, staying motivated, managing your time and much more. Provides you with profound mind sets that help you finish.
- Treatment Transfer: The Department of Rehabilitation and Correction established a Treatment Transfer Program at the Ohio State Penitentiary Camp in March of 2016 for community-based substance abuse disorder treatment for qualified offenders. The purpose of the program is to provide substance abuse disorder assessment and treatment through community treatment providers to help reduce substance abuse relapses and recidivism for qualified offenders while preparing them for reentry into the community and improving public safety.
- Free on the Inside: Free on the Inside is an offender led group that was established in November 2016 at the Ohio State Penitentiary Correctional Camp (OSPCC). The mission of FOTI is to raise and maintain the morale within our offender community. FOTI is open to all offenders and at the end of the year 51% of the proceeds raised go to a charitable organization.
- Expanded Food and Nutrition Education for Adult with Children (EFNEP): The Expanded Food & Nutrition Education Program (EFNEP) is a free program designed to help limited-resource families with children make healthier choices. The lessons are research-based and delivered with an interactive and hands-on approach. Participants increase skills in decision making related to nutrition, stretching food dollars, increasing physical activity, parenting, food safety and resource management. Participants also receive a food tasting and educational enhancements that encourage skill implementation outside the classroom.
- Reversion Unit: National attitudes and the recent changes in American Correctional Association regarding restrictive housing has led to reviewing the issue of releasing restrictive housing inmates, directly to the

community from a non-contact environment. The Reversion program was created to help try to reintegrate maximum security offenders from a restrictive housing environment to the community. The Reversion program provides inmates with appropriate programming, meaningful activities and pro-socialization with friends and family. Inmates are screened by a multidisciplinary team monthly to ensure that the participants are willing to participate. Screenings are generally limited to at least 6 months from release however there have been offenders that get in with longer than 6 months before release. Inmates selected for the program agree to participate in any programming provided in the program and agree to a higher standard of rules and regulations to ensure a pro-social environment.

▪**New Roots:** The New Roots program is a concept that was developed to prepare higher security level offenders for reentry into the community. This process begins 12 months prior to an offender's release and continues throughout the remainder of their sentence. The New Roots process will include development of Transitional Skills, Work Shops, Cognitive Programming, family reintegration along with community and mentoring support. The development of transitional skills is to ease their transition from incarceration to life in the community. This part of the program consists of 9-weekly sessions that focus on a variety of topics to assist the offender and develop individual abilities. Workshops will promote their knowledge and use of services which include the Ohio Benefit Bank, Child Support, BMV, Job Skills, Veteran Services, and Financial Planning. Cognitive programming including Decision Points, consists of five comprehensive lessons which will be taught on a continuing basis. Studies have shown that cognitive programming can reduce recidivism. Family reintegration will bring the support person and the offender together in a workshop environment to encourage prosocial activities. The families will also be educated on issues and barriers the offender may face upon release. The program begins with a "Kick Off" and orientation process for the participants to provide motivation into the program.

▪**Decision Points:** Decision Points' focus is on developing positive means of problem-solving by both cognitive restructuring and social skills interventions. Decision Points is comprised of 5 lessons and is a re-entry essential program.

### Unique Programs

- OASIS Therapeutic Community: a collaborative effort between the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction, the Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services, and the Pickaway Correctional Institution servicing male offenders with substance abuse problems. OASIS stands for "Our Awareness of Self Increases Success" and the name was created by its first residents. TC focuses the residents on right living in a pro-social community and recovery through a shared therapeutic structure that includes communal meetings, encounter groups, education, organized recreation, and the like. There are 2 paths in OASIS: one is an Intensive Program Prison model that runs 4 months at PCI and 3 months in the community. The other is a long-term program running 9-12 months in the institution. Residents are held to a high degree of accountability. Staff are there to help guide and assist, but the residents are the primary role models holding each other to a high standard. TC has proven very effective in helping offenders "go home to stay".
- OPI Print Shop: a full service "sheet fed" printing facility. It employs offenders in the production of official forms, business cards, brochures, training manuals, flyers, bindery, quick copy digital production, typesetting, quality assurance, inventory and packaging.

▪Sinclair Community College: Certificate offerings are designed to increase employability upon release from incarceration. Certificates range from one semester to three semesters in duration and include the following options: Food Production Specialist, Bakery Specialist, Pastry Specialist, Social Service Assistant, Communication Specialist, User Support Technician, Re-entry Preparation, Entrepreneurship and Business Foundations, and Supply Chain Technician. Courses are taught by Sinclair Community College faculty both traditionally and via distance learning. Students receive the same caliber of instruction in the institutional setting that they would if they were attending classes at any of Sinclair's campuses. The students are further supported by a twenty-computer lab where they can work on assignments and hone their computer skills in preparation for their re-entry into society.

▪Reading Room: The reading rooms encourage family literacy by providing a pleasant and comfortable setting for both child and incarcerated parent. Each room is stocked with a wide variety of children's books and has an inmate narrator who reads to the visiting children twice a day. The role of the inmate narrator is to read picture books to the children in much the same manner that children's hour would be done at a public library. A variety of arts and craft supplies for the children are also available in most of the rooms. Many of the supplies and books are donated by employees and service organizations.

### **Unique Programs**

- Pound Puppy Program:** The Pound Puppy program trains 7 to 8 dogs each cycle, which lasts 7 weeks. The dogs are taught 5 basic commands and 2 certified instructor volunteers are utilized from the Richland County Dog Kennel Club. The program works in conjunction with Kind Hands 4 Paws (Zanesville), Logan County Shelter (Bellevue), and Mid-Ohio Animal Welfare League.
- Reintegration Housing:** The Reintegration Housing Unit seeks to provide offenders with a pro social environment conducive for self-development. The unit focuses upon instilling responsibility and accountability by offering a variety of programming to address criminogenic needs, as well as meaningful activities and community service.
- Roots for Success:** This program is an environmental literacy program consisting of ten modules: Fundamentals of Environmental Literacy; Water; Waste; Transportation; Energy; Building; Health, Food & Agriculture; Community Organizing & Leadership; Application and Practice; Financial Literacy & Social Entrepreneurship. Upon completion of the program, the offenders will receive a certificate of completion nationally recognized by various sectors for green collared jobs.
- Commercial Driver's License (CDL):** This is a career enhancement program that allows an offender to take the written exam for a commercial driver's license. Upon successful completion of the exam, the offender will engage in a four-week training program administered by Trainco, a professional truck driving school. This program includes 40 hours of instructional classroom work followed by three weeks of pre-trip vehicle inspection, maneuverability, and road test.
- Recovery Residential Unit:** The Recovery Bay Residential unit seeks to work with unit staff and recovery service staff to provide a residential unit that encourages a therapeutic environment to address recovery needs. Offenders that are participating in the 90-day Intensive Outpatient Program, which is provided by Recovery Services staff and functions to install knowledge into offenders regarding the disease of chemical dependency and its effect on the various areas of the offenders' life reside in the housing unit. This programming is approached in a holistic manner rather than strictly discussing substance abuse, and offenders receive 9 hours of group work for 12 weeks.
- Reading Room:** The reading rooms encourage family literacy by providing a pleasant and comfortable setting for both child and incarcerated parent. Each room is stocked with a wide variety of children's books and has an inmate narrator who reads to the visiting children twice a day. The role of the inmate narrator is to read picture books to the children in much the same manner that children's hour would be done at a public library. The program provides a positive environment where people who have similar problems can live and work together to improve their lives. Provisions are made so the environment is cohesive within the program milieu. Therefore, the Staff of New Life Program is providing the highest degree of comprehensive quality care including; chemical dependency education, counseling, healthy life choices, and a life of sobriety.
- Reading Room: The reading room is to encourage family literacy by providing a pleasant and comfortable setting for you and your child. (All children must be escorted by an adult in the reading room) The room is stocked with a wide variety of children's books, art and craft supplies, toys, games and a television. Many of the books and supplies are donated by employees and service organizations. There is a reading room attendant that will issue out board games, cards and coloring materials that may be enjoyed at your table as well.

▪**Going Home for Good:** The Going Home for Good (GHFG) unit program is a 12-month long program designed to provide Level 3 offenders the skills and opportunities they will need to transition back into Ohio's communities. GHFG is the first restorative housing at a Level 3 institution in the State of Ohio. GHFG programming will supply inmates with the necessary tools needed to change their behavior and become responsible and accountable to themselves, their families and the community. GHFG program offers opportunities for offenders to obtain job skills to secure employment upon release.

- When making a reservation please provide the inmates name and ID number, as well as the date, time, and number of visitors for your reservation. You will be given a confirmation number which you will need for check-in.
- The Southeastern Correctional Complex Lancaster/ Hocking maintains video visiting kiosks in every general population housing unit. The hours of availability for video visiting are as follows: Morning session is 7:30a.m. to 10:30a.m., Afternoon session is 11:50a.m. to 2:50p.m., and evening session is 5:30p.m. to 8:30p.m.
- Video visits are 30 minutes in duration and an additional 30 minutes may be requested if there is no one scheduled at the same kiosk immediately after the conclusion of the initial video visit.
- Visitation will be limited to 2 visitors per inmate per visiting session. Inmates are permitted 1 visiting session per month. Joint visits with multiple inmates are prohibited unless they are biologically related and will require approval of the managing officer.
- When the weather permits, outside visiting is available, visitors will be seated at the officer's discretion.
- Reservations can be made a maximum 30 days in advance. The minimum notice will be 7 days before visit.

### **Unique Programs**

- Harvest: The Recovery Services Department at the Southeastern Correctional Institution offers a reentry-approved, earned credit-approved three-month cognitive behavioral therapy alcohol and drug treatment program. The Harvest Intensive Outpatient treatment program focuses on helping participants develop cognitive strategies and positive behavioral skills to restructure their lifestyle. Upon successful completion of the program, participants are eligible for continuing care services that include professionally facilitated group meetings and Alcoholics Anonymous/Narcotics Anonymous fellowship meetings.
- Intensive Program Prison (IPP): The IPP program is a voluntary program that allows the offender a second chance to change. Program eligibility is determined at the reception phase of the offender's incarceration. The offender completes ninety days of actual incarceration and is then placed on post release supervision for an appropriate period of time. The SCI IPP Environmentally Conscientious Opportunities (ECO) system incorporates three components, education, skill development, and programming to provide the participant with work related skills, training, and experience to increase their understanding of environmental issues and the green economy, while simultaneously strengthening their academic and labor market skills, thus enhancing their opportunity for gainful employment upon release from incarceration.
- Reading Room: The reading rooms encourage family literacy by providing a pleasant and comfortable setting for both child and incarcerated parent. Each room is stocked with a wide variety of children's books and has an inmate narrator who reads to the visiting children twice a day. The role of the inmate narrator is to read picture books to the children in much the same manner that children's hour would be done at a public library. A variety of arts and craft supplies for the children are also available in most of the rooms. Many of the supplies and books are donated by employees and service organizations

### **Visiting Hours**

- Visitation will be 2 days a week, Thursday and Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 2:45 p.m. for our general population offenders.
- Visitation will not operate Saturday – Wednesday or state recognized holidays
- Reservations are mandatory and can be made Wednesday – Sunday between 8:00 am – 2:30 pm by calling 330-898-0820 ext.
- The visiting sessions will be for one hour and entry into the institution and testing will occur on a staggered basis.
- It will be necessary to show up for your visit ½ hour in advance so that you can be given a BD Variator antigen test (Rapid COVID Test).
- Each session will count as 1 visit. All offenders are allowed one visit per month and we are not allowing all day visits at this time.
- Only two video visits may be scheduled in the institution at one time.
- Video visits must be scheduled at least 24 hours in advance of the time that they are requesting.
- The hours of availability for video visits are as follows: 7:00 A.M. to 10:00 A.M.; 11:30 A.M. to 3:00 P.M.; and 4:30 P.M. to 8:30 P.M.
- Visits are 30 minutes in duration; however, an additional 30 minutes can be requested if there is no one scheduled immediately after the conclusion of the initial video visit.

### **Unique Programs**

- **Family Worship:** Once per quarter, a family worship service is held by the institution Chaplain. This service allows pre-screened inmates to attend a non-denominational service with family and friends from their approved visiting list. Services are available at both the camp and main compound.
- **Music With a Purpose:** This program provides inmates the opportunity to enroll in musical classes that teaches musical theory, musical application, how to properly use musical instruments and vocal classes. After the inmates complete their classes, they are provided the opportunity to audition for one of the fourteen bands that are organized through the Recreation Department. This program allows the inmates to perform musical selections in a concert setting for family members, friends, and staff members.
- **Wellness Unit:** The Wellness Unit is a housing unit with a mission of providing a community environment that has a holistic approach to health and is conducive to personal growth and a healthy lifestyle. Offenders who live in the Wellness Unit must adhere to behavior criteria and attend at least 24 hours of programming each week in addition to their education and work requirements. In-housing programs include religious services, recovery services, mental wellness along with health and fitness while encompassing the mind body and soul of each participant.
- **Restorative Justice Unit:** This Housing unit is specifically designed for inmates to participate in giving back to the community. They donate time and talent by completing community service projects that are then donated to those in need. The inmates are required to sign an agreement prior to entering the program. The participants also maintain a daily journal and participate in programming such as Victim Awareness, Moral Reasoning, and art classes.

- Certified Electronics Technician Program: Certified Electronics Technician (CET) is a one-year inmate led program teaching inmates the ins and outs of electronics. The class is taught by a technologically talented & certified inmate who takes pride in passing his knowledge to others. The instruction occurs in a classroom, but the unique part is the experience gained by working with the electronics. The students assist in the electronic shop in the mornings. The shop offers repair services to general population at no cost to the inmates. The program began in the year 2013 and also promotes recycling by repairing items that would otherwise be sent to a landfill. Just as important, is it teaches inmates valuable and employable skills.
- Reading Room: The reading rooms encourage family literacy by providing a pleasant and comfortable setting for both child and incarcerated parent. Each room is stocked with a wide variety of children's books and has an inmate narrator who reads to the visiting children twice a day. The role of the inmate narrator is to read picture books to the children in much the same manner that children's hour would be done at a public library. A variety of arts and craft supplies for the children are also available in most of the rooms. Many of the supplies and books are donated by employees and service organizations.
- One Stop: The Offender Network for Employment to STOP Recidivism (O.N.E.-STOP) is a collaboration between ODRC, the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services, and local workforce development partners. The O.N.E.-STOP shop is located within the prison to offer reentry planning, educational workshops, and Ohio Reentry Connections resources. The reentry resources mirror the OhioMeansJobs.com statewide job matching services for individuals within one year to release. The institution O.N.E.-STOP shop was designed to assist offenders in seeking employment prior to release, along with training, and support services: with the goal of helping to reduce recidivism.
- New Roots: The New Roots program is a concept that was developed to prepare higher security level offenders for reentry into the community. This process begins 12 months prior to an offender's release and continues throughout the remainder of their sentence. The New Roots process will include development of Transitional Skills, Work Shops, Cognitive Programming, family reintegration along with community and mentoring support. The development of transitional skills is to ease their transition from incarceration to life in the community. This part of the program consists of 9-weekly sessions that focus on a variety of topics to assist the offender and develop individual abilities. Workshops will promote their knowledge and use of services which include the Ohio Benefit Bank, Child Support, BMV, Job Skills, Veteran Services, and Financial Planning. Cognitive programming including *Decision Points*, consists of five comprehensive lessons which will be taught on a continuing basis. Studies have shown that cognitive programming can reduce recidivism. Family reintegration will bring the support person and the offender together in a workshop environment to encourage prosocial activities. The families will also be educated on issues and barriers the offender may face upon release. The program begins with a "Kick Off" and orientation process for the participants to provide motivation into the program.

### Unique Programs

- Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP): This is a six-month treatment program that addresses drug and alcohol problems. This is a Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) program which is Reentry and Earned Credit approved. The purpose of the program is: To provide effective evidence based cognitive behavioral interventions to treat alcohol and other drug use disorders and to prevent relapse for Ohio's incarcerated felons, including those with co-morbid conditions; To reduce tax payer expense and burden to state revenue by providing effective substance use disorder treatment that promotes positive change in the offender's lives. Recovery services programs have demonstrated success at reducing recidivism (source: 2011 CIIC Report). National research regarding recovery service programs shows that such programs result in significant cost savings of approximately \$7 or more dollars return for each dollar spent in programming through reductions in recidivism among program completers.
- Day Treatment Program (DTP): The DTP is a residential unit designed to be an intermediate step between RTU level of care and general population for offenders with severe mental illness. DTP offenders do not need RTU level of care but are determined to be more vulnerable to decompensation or are unable to function in general population without more intensive support. The DTP offers individualized mental health treatment including activity therapy and medication management.
- Reading Room: The reading rooms encourage family literacy by providing a pleasant and comfortable setting for both child and incarcerated parent. Each room is stocked with a wide variety of children's books and has an inmate narrator who reads to the visiting children twice a day. The role of the inmate narrator is to read picture books to the children in much the same manner that children's hour would be done at a public library. A variety of arts and craft supplies for the children are also available in most of the rooms. Many of the supplies and books are donated by employees and service organizations.
