COLUMBUS, OHIO – Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS) Director Matt Damschroder today provided a quarterly update on unemployment overpayments. The overpayments are attributable to both fraudulent and non-fraudulent activity in both the traditional unemployment and Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) programs. They include any weekly monetary add-ons claimants received, called Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation.

As of December 31, 2023, ODJFS had identified approximately \$6.9 billion in fraud and non-fraud overpayments. This includes:

- \$194 million in fraudulent overpayments in the traditional unemployment system.
- \$1 billion in fraudulent PUA overpayments.
- \$912 million in non-fraud overpayments in the traditional unemployment system.
- \$4.8 billion in non-fraud PUA overpayments.

ODJFS has instituted a series of anti-fraud measures and is collaborating with financial institutions and law enforcement to recover overpaid amounts. To date, the following recoveries have been reported to the U.S. Department of Labor:

- \$34.6 million in fraudulent overpayments in the traditional unemployment system.
- \$24.2 million in fraudulent PUA overpayments.
- \$104.8 million in non-fraud overpayments in the traditional unemployment system.
- \$167.2 million in non-fraud PUA overpayments.

Fraud and non-fraud overpayments are reported to the U.S. Department of Labor on a regular basis for cases in which the agency issues an appealable determination. Therefore, the numbers are fluid. They change as pending claims are processed, as appeals are evaluated, and/or if the agency receives evidence that a previously identified non-fraud overpayment was actually the result of identity theft or other types of fraud.
