Ohio's Unemployment Rate Decreased to 3.7% in April

Ohio's unemployment rate was 3.7% in April 2023, down from 3.8% in March 2023. Ohio's nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased 18,100 over the month, from a revised 5,590,500 in March to 5,608,600 in April. This marks the lowest unemployment rate since 1976 when the series for reporting unemployment started.

The number of workers unemployed in Ohio in April was 211,000, down from 218,000 in March. The number of unemployed has decreased by 12,000 in the past 12 months from 223,000. The April unemployment rate for Ohio decreased 0.2% from 3.9% in April 2022. The U.S. unemployment rate for April 2023 was 3.4%, down from 3.5% in March 2023, and down from 3.6% in April 2022.

In April 2023, the labor force participation rate in Ohio was 61.8%, up from 61.5% in March 2023 and unchanged from 61.8% in April 2022. During the same period, the national labor force participation rate was 62.6%, unchanged from 62.6% in March 2023 and up from 62.2% in April 2022. Establishment Survey Data

Ohio's nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased 18,100 over the month, from a revised 5,590,500 in March to 5,608,600 in April, according to the latest business establishment survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Labor (Bureau of Labor Statistics) in cooperation with the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services (ODJFS).

Employment in goods-producing industries, at 943,000, increased 2,500 with gains in construction (+1,600); manufacturing (+700); and mining and logging (+200). The private service-providing sector, at 3,896,000, increased 15,900 as gains in leisure and hospitality (+6,200); professional and business services (+3,400); private educational and health services (+2,800); other services (+2,400); trade, transportation, and utilities (+1,600); and financial activities (+100) surpassed losses in information (-600). Government employment, at 769,600, decreased 300 as losses in local government (-500) exceeded gains in federal government (+200). State government employment did not change over the month.

From April 2022 to April 2023, nonagricultural wage and salary employment increased 84,000. Employment in goods-producing industries increased 18,000. Manufacturing increased 9,400 as gains in durable goods (+9,600) outpaced losses in nondurable goods (-200). Construction added 7,900 jobs and mining and logging gained 700 jobs. Employment in the private service-providing sector increased 61,300 as gains in private educational and health services (+27,700); leisure and hospitality (+27,300); other services (+12,200); financial activities (+4,200); and professional and business services (+800) outweighed losses in trade, transportation, and utilities (-9,200) and information (-1,700). Government employment increased 4,700 with gains in federal (+2,300); state (+1,700); and local (+700) government.

EDITOR'S NOTE: All data cited are produced in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor. Data sources include the Current Population Survey (U.S. data), Current Employment Statistics Program (nonagricultural wage and salary employment data), and Local Area Unemployment Statistics Program (Ohio unemployment rates).
