


The First Day of Winter




About the Author

Talk about it!

Topics to share when discussing this book with children

- Before reading, look at the book cover. What do you think this story will be about? How do you know it is winter?
- The first day of winter falls in December just before Christmas. Talk about winter. What is the weather like? What holidays do people celebrate? How do we dress in winter? How do animals prepare for winter?
- Talk about animals in winter. Which animals hibernate? Which do not? How do wild animals find food in winter? Talk about camouflage, what it is and why it takes place.
- The First Day of Winter counts up to 10 days. Count the numbers one through ten. Look around you. What do you see one of? Two of...?
- What colors are named in the text of this story? Look at the illustrations. Are colors used in the illustrations that are not named in the story? What are they?
- What types of objects were used to decorate the snowman?
- There are several different types of birds in this story. Find and name them. Some birds stay in the same place for winter and some birds migrate. What is migration? Why does it happen?
- What are the differences between snow, rain, ice and water? What happens to liquids when they get cold?

Learn and have fun!

Here are some fun ideas for extending the story

- Make a mashed-potato snow-friend (instant mashed potatoes work well; allow children to measure, pour and mix!)
- Present a flannel board story using **The First Day of Winter** items
- Make paper snowflakes, with scissors or just tear them!
- Create a paper collage using the colors mentioned in the text of The First Day of Winter.
- Make bird feeders using pinecones rolled in peanut butter and birdseed.
 Place them outside in a visible spot, and watch to see what happens!
- Make button necklaces and then play "who has the button" or a similar game using a large button.

Take a Trip!

Weather permitting....go outside and build a snowman!

- Animals in winter/hibernation/migration
- Snow and ice
- Colors

Winter Rhymes

Royal Penguins

One royal penguin feeling very blue

Called for his brother, then there were two.

Two royal penguins swimming in the sea,

Called for their sister and then there three.

Three royal penguins waddle on the shore

Called for their mother, then there were four

Four royal penguins learning how to dive

Called for their father, then there were five

Let's count them together: one, two, three, four, five



The Snow Fell Softly

The snow fell softly all the night (Flutter fingers down)
It made a blanket soft and white (Spread hands to make blanket)
It covered houses (Hands make top of roof)
Flowers (Ten fingers up)
And ground (Hands flat)
But never made a single sound (Whispered)

Snowflakes Falling (Tune: Mary Had a Little Lamb)

Snowflakes falling all around,
All around, all around. (Flutter fingers for snow)
Snowflakes falling all around,
Until they covered the ground. (Spread hands out to pantomime ground)

In the Winter Sky

Way up high in the winter sky (point to sky)
Two little snowflakes caught my eye (hold up 2 fingers, point to eye)
Down to the ground they fall without a sound (crouch down)
And before very long, it was snowing all around! (spin around)

Dressing for Winter (Pantomime actions as described)

This is how we dress on a cold winter's day.
We put on our snowsuits to go out and play.
Then we put on our boots for walking in the snow.
Next our hats and our mittens,
'Cause the wind begins to blow.
And now we're all ready to go out and play.
We'll stay nice and warm on this cold winter day.

Tie It In!

Using this book with the Ohio Pre-Kindergarten Content Standards

The Ohio Department of Education adopted revised Pre-Kindergarten Content Standards in 2011. These standards describe what young learners should know and be able to do in English language arts, mathematics, science and social studies before entering kindergarten. Early childhood educators are implementing these standards in their schools and centers. Every Choose to Read Ohio book for young children may be used to support the English and Language Arts Reading Standards for Literature and Reading Standards: Foundational Skills. Here are examples of activities using **The First Day of Winter** that align with Pre-K standards.

English Language Arts

 Phonological awareness – clap to the rhythm/tune of "The Twelve Days of Christmas" as you read the book aloud.

Mathematics

- Counting and cardinality Understanding the concepts of counting and numbers.
 Use a visual such as a felt board with cut-outs to demonstrate the red cap, blue mittens, etc.
- Geometry Identify and describe shapes. Use the felt pieces to identify shapes circles to represent the snowman, berries, buttons; triangles in the leaves, etc.
- Operations and algebraic thinking Understand subtraction as taking apart and taking from. Use the felt pieces to demonstrate subtraction at the end of the story. Start with the peanuts and count as you remove the pieces.

Science

- Earth and Space Sciences observations of nature and the exploration of the natural environment. Discuss changes in weather. Why is it cold out? Where does snow come from? How is ice formed?
- Physical Science making sound/observing, exploring and describing properties of objects and material that can be found in nature, classrooms, and homes. Bring the snowman to the classroom bring a red cap, blue mittens, a scarf, buttons, etc. and allow the child(ren) to feel the objects and describe the objects and their purpose.

Social Studies

• History Strand – words associated with time are meaningful in the context of daily classroom routines. After you have read through the story ask the children what happened first, second, third, etc. Ask the students to describe a time they built a snowman or made something. What did they do first, second, third, etc.?

Get Ready To Read!

Encouraging early literacy skill-building in young children

Many of the ideas listed in this toolkit incorporate the **six early literacy skills** that help children get ready to read. Recognizing letters (Letter Knowledge) and understanding that they make sounds that form words (Phonological Awareness). Knowing that things have names and being able to name them (Vocabulary). Telling a story or describing events that happened in a story (Narrative Skills). Noticing and recognizing text (Print Awareness), and the interest in and enjoyment of books (Print Motivation). All of these things lead to children being ready to learn how to read when they begin school.
