Talk About It

Topics to share when discussing When the Stars Lead to You with teens.

Spoiler warning! Some discussion questions refer to key elements in the book. Do not read if you do not want to find out what happens.

Devon and Ashton's relationship has a series of highs and lows. Using
the text, highlight some signs that indicate evidence of mental
instability on Ashton's part. Describe the ways the author
communicates Devon's emotional turmoil by the end of the summer.
Is Devon's heartbreak believable? Use the text to support your
argument.

Talk About It (continued)

- Devon's heartbreak is nearly healed when Ashton shows up at her school as a new student. How does Ashton's sudden appearance affect Devon? Does his explanation of his disappearance make him a sympathetic character? Use the text to support your argument.
- Teen depression is one of the major topics in this novel. In what ways does Ashton's depression affect the overall tone of the story? What themes surprised you in this novel? Visit the author's website (ronnidavis.com) and learn more about her process in creating this story.
- Devon's mother is African American and her father is white. How does living at the intersection of two races makes life different for Devon? How is her relationship different with each parent? How does her parents' relationship impact Devon's relationship with Ashton?
- Ashton's mother is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution. What impact does his
 mother's membership in this group have on Ashton's relationship with Devon? Do you agree with
 Ashton's mother's treatment of Devon?
- Throughout the story, Devon struggles to maintain an equilibrium in her personal life and at school. Examine the text for three instances where Devon has to employ self-preservation. Explain how Devon's relationship with Ashton acts as a catalyst for derailment of her dreams. What are some of the support systems that help Devon thrive?

Go Further

Ideas for extending the experience of reading When the Stars Lead to You.

- Racism and classism are two of the topics explored in **When the Stars Lead to You**. What are some of the ways race and class still affect the ways people of different races and classes interact today? In what ways have race relations improved or changed over the past 20 years?
- Ashton's struggles with depression feature prominently in this novel. Search the internet and develop a
 list of some mental health resources available to teens dealing with depression. Examine these
 resources and evaluate them for usability, language, and style. Which resources stand out to you?
 What makes each a good or bad resource? Which sites seem best for teens who are concerned about
 a friend's mental health?
- Using online resources available to students through INFOhio (<u>infohio.org</u>) and to all Ohio residents through Ohio Web Library (<u>ohioweblibrary.org</u>), research the Daughters of the American Revolution. Compare and contrast their stated values with their practices. How have their values and practices changed over time?
