State Medical Board of Ohio Annual Report - Fiscal Year 2018 (FY18)

July 1, 2017 – June 30, 2018

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Agency Mission & Goals

The State Medical Board of Ohio issues licenses and oversees the practice of allopathic physicians (MD), osteopathic physicians (DO), podiatric physicians (DPM), massage therapists (LMT), and cosmetic therapists (CT) under the authority of the Medical Practices Act, Chapter 4731, Ohio Revised Code (ORC). The Medical Board continues to regulate naprapaths and mechanotherapists licensed by the Board before March 1992.

The Medical Board also regulates Physician Assistants, ORC Chapter 4730, Dietitians, ORC Chapter 4759, Anesthesiologist Assistants, ORC Chapter 4760, Respiratory Care Professionals, ORC Chapter 4761, Acupuncture & Oriental Medicine, ORC Chapter 4762, ORC, Radiologist Assistants, ORC Chapter 4774, and Genetic Counselors, ORC Chapter 4778.

The Medical Board's regulatory responsibilities include investigating complaints against applicants and licensees and taking disciplinary action against those who violate the public health and safety standards set by the General Assembly and the Medical Board.

Agency Mission

To protect and enhance the health and safety of the public through effective medical regulation.

Agency Goals

- Ensure persons practicing medicine meet sufficient standards of education, training, competence and ethics.
- Define and advocate for standards of safe medical practice.
- Prohibit persons from practicing medicine whose violations are so egregious as to forfeit the privilege or who otherwise lack the legal authority.
- > Provide information about the licensees of the Medical Board, the Board's functions and operations, and the laws governing the practice of medicine.
- Achieve and maintain the highest possible levels of organizational efficacy.

Board Consolidation

In January of 2018, the Ohio Board of Dietetics and Ohio Respiratory Care Board were merged with the State Medical Board of Ohio as outlined in the State of Ohio Biennial Budget (House Bill 49). Substitute House Bill 145, effective February 8, 2018, further aligned operating procedures of the boards, such as license renewal cycles and investigation processes. The Medical Board acquired three full-time positions because of the merger, relocating existing board staff members to the Medical Board offices. HB 49 also created the Dietetics Advisory Council and Respiratory Care Advisory Council. The advisory councils are a means for members to make recommendations to the Board regarding policies and rules relating to the practice, including:

- Policies and requirements for license issuance, renewal and fees
- Existing and proposed rules
- Standards for approval of educational programs and continuing education
- Scope of practice, ethical conduct and minimal standards of care for the safe and effective practice of the profession.

More information on the duties and structure of the council can be found in ORC 4759.051 (dietetics) and 4761.032 (respiratory care).

About the Medical Board

Composition: The State Medical Board of Ohio is comprised of twelve members: nine physicians (seven MD, one DO, one DPM) and three non-physician public members. The Board members are appointed by the Governor and serve five-year terms. Appointment terms are staggered to provide continuity and Board members may be reappointed. Two members are selected by their peers on the Board to serve as the Board's Secretary and Supervising Member who oversee the Board's investigatory and enforcement processes.

During FY18, the Medical Board met each month in the Administrative Hearing Room on the 3rd floor of the Rhodes Office Tower, 30 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio. Meeting agendas and minutes are available on the Board's website, med.ohio.gov. The Board also met on 2/3/2018 by telephone conference to accept a voluntary surrender of a license and held one retreat to discuss specific issues.

Agency Staffing and Funding: The Executive Director oversees day-to-day operations of the agency. During FY18, staffing levels included 84.5 positions. Medical Board operations are funded exclusively through licensing and other authorized fees that are non-general revenue fund sources.

Staffing Strategy: Whenever a vacancy occurs, the Board re-examines the need for the specific duties and priorities before backfilling the position. In many cases a vacant position is repurposed to another area of higher need. During FY18 the Board continued to operate within its personnel ceiling of 84.5 positions. Temporary services were used as needed to address any gaps in workflow.

Fiscal Report

FY18 Revenue by Revenue Category

Medical Board operations are funded exclusively through licensing and other authorized fees. The agency receives no funding from the state's general revenue sources. The Board received a record high \$11,037,250 in revenue in FY18; 13% higher than its previous high in FY16 of \$9,768,451.

Approximately \$1.2 million came from renewals of Respiratory Care Professionals and Dietitians. These two professions renew at the same time (are not staggered) and this will happen again in FY20. Another significant portion of the increase included just over \$222,000 in fines received.

The Board finished the year well under its \$10,163,504 budget. Final numbers will not be available until November 2018, when the Board finishes spending from its FY18 encumbrances (purchase orders).

FY19 began July 1, 2018 with a budget of \$11,064,757.

In January 2018 the Medical Board acquired the former **Respiratory Care** and Dietetics Boards' responsibilities and licensees. This resulted in increased revenue of over \$1 million during the fiscal year.

Ohio Physician Loan Repayment Program (OPLRP)

Ohio physician loan repayment program contribution: \$396,390

Physician licensure biennial renewal fees are \$305 and \$285 of the fee supports Medical Board operations. The remaining \$20 is deposited in the state treasury for the Ohio Physician Loan Repayment Fund as required in ORC 4731.281(A), to support the OPLRP managed by the Ohio Department of Health. The OPLRP is designed to increase access to primary care for underserved communities and populations. In exchange for loan repayment assistance, physicians commit to practice for a minimum of two years at an eligible site in a Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) or Health Resource Shortage Area, accept Medicare and Medicaid, and see patients regardless of ability to pay.

The State Medical Board of Ohio continues to be financially solvent, with a cash balance of \$ 4,869,161 as of June 30, 2018. During FY18, the Department of Administrative Services transferred \$1,114,680 from the Board's cash balance for the Medial Board's share for development of the eLicense project.

The licensure responsibilities of the Medical Board ensure that those practicing medicine and the other professions regulated by the agency meet sufficient standards of education, training, competency and ethics. Emeritus Registration: Physicians, massage therapists and cosmetic therapists who have been licensed in Ohio for at least 10 years and who have retired from active practice qualify for Emeritus Registration. Emeritus practitioners are no longer entitled to engage in the practice of medicine, massage therapy or cosmetic therapy. There were 216 emeritus registrations issued in FY18.

Volunteer's Certificates: ORC 4731.295 allows the Board to issue a volunteer's certificate to an MD or DO who has retired from active practice so that the doctor may provide medical services to indigent or uninsured persons. A volunteer's certificate holder may not accept any form of remuneration for providing medical services. The certificate is valid for three years and may be renewed. One volunteer certificate was issued in FY18.

Licensure Examinations

Licensure examinations for allopathic physicians (MD), osteopathic physicians (DO), and podiatric physicians (DPM) are administered by national examining boards and are offered throughout the year in a computerized format. Successful completion of national certification examinations is also required for those applying for licensure as an anesthesiologist assistant, radiologist assistant, physician assistant, dietitian, genetic counselor, massage therapist, acupuncturist, oriental medicine practitioner or respiratory care professional.

The Medical Board administers a licensure examination for cosmetic therapy applicants. Nineteen candidates sat for the cosmetic therapy licensure exam which was offered seven times during FY18. Successful completion of the Ohio exam is required for cosmetic therapy licensure.

Limited Branch Schools

The Medical Board issues Certificates of Good Standing to schools offering courses in massage therapy or cosmetic therapy that satisfying the statutory requirements for curriculum content and instruction hours. The complete list of approved limited branch schools is available on the Medical Board's website, med.ohio.gov.

Staff continue to engage in continuous improvement efforts that redefine work processes, aligning with the eLicense system capabilities, identifying and resolving system issues as they arise, and identifying system enhancements to improve the user experience. All renewals are now processed and paid via credit card online through the eLicense system except naprapath, mechanotherapist, and restricted cosmetic therapist applications.

Licensure Application Forms Streamlined: During FY18, the Board approved revisions to the Ohio physician licensure and allied health application forms which eliminated material no longer applicable with the conversion to online application forms. Certificates of recommendation, employer recommendations, photographs, and notarized affidavits were eliminated from the application forms.

Physician Licensure Application Fee Reduced: HB49, the State of Ohio Biennial Budget Bill, included a provision that cut the initial license application fee for MD, DO and DPM from \$335 to \$305 effective 9/29/2017.

Training Certificate Valid for Three Years: Until 9/27/2017, training certificates issued to those participating in Ohio medical residency or fellowship training programs had to renew the training certificate annually. Provisions in HB49 changed the length of time a training certificate is valid from one year to three years which syncs the training certificate up to the duration of most residency training programs. For those in extended training programs, training certificates may be renewed one time for an additional three years.

MD-DO-DPM Continuing Medical Education (CME) Cycle Changed: Physicians are required to complete a specific number of CMEs for renewal. Previously, those CMEs had to be completed three months prior to the actual license renewal date. As of 9/29/2017, legislative changes in HB49 aligned the CME cycle with the expiration date of the physician's license.

Certificates to Prescribe Medical Marijuana: House Bill 523, effective 9/8/2016, established the Ohio Medical Marijuana Control Program and tasked the State Medical Board of Ohio with establishing the procedure to issue certificates to physicians wishing to recommend medical marijuana to patients with qualifying conditions. Criteria for certificate to recommend (CTR) issuance are outlined in OAC 4731-32-02. The first group of CTR applications were approved by the Board on 3/19/2018. As of 6/30/2018 there was a total of 139 active CTRs.

Licensure Renewal

The Medical Board uses a staggered system for the biennial licensure renewal of allopathic physicians, osteopathic physicians, podiatric physicians, massage therapists and cosmetic therapists. The first letter of the licensee's last name determines if the license expires on January 1, April 1, July 1, or October 1, in either even numbered or odd numbered years.

The licenses of anesthesiologist assistants, physician assistants, radiologist assistants, genetic counselors, acupuncturists and oriental medicine practitioners expire on January 31 of even-numbered years. Dietitians and Respiratory Care Professionals expire on June 30 of even numbered years.



Complaints

The Medical Board protects the public through effective medical regulation. The Board investigates complaints, takes disciplinary actions against those who violate the Medical Practices Act and other applicable statutes and rules, and monitors licensees on probation.


Complaints

Complaints inform the Board of potential problems with a licensee's practice. Complaints are received from a variety of sources, including the public, agency staff, state and national regulatory agencies, physicians, self-reports from licensees, hospitals, and others such as law enforcement and the media.

Types of complaints received include patient care concerns, inappropriate prescribing issues, discrepancies in licensure application information, criminal activity, impairment due to chemical dependency, ethical violations, office practice management concerns, and other issues.

Two Medical Board members, the Secretary and the Supervising Member, oversee the agency's investigative and enforcement activities. Complaints are reviewed to determine if the Board has jurisdiction over the subject of the complaint, and if so, if the allegations violate a section of Ohio law or a rule enforced by the Medical Board. The complaints received, and investigations conducted by the Board are confidential per ORC 4731.22(F).

Investigations, Standards Review and **Quality Intervention**

Investigations

The Medical Board employs 20 field investigators who are based throughout the state. The Investigation Manual was revised and launched 6/28/2018, outlining updated procedures outsourcing the subpoena service and licensee drug screening. In July 2017 investigators began harnessing the features of eLicense backoffice to create and submit their Reports of Investigation and daily reports; reports were previously submitted through SharePoint. The median number of days from the referral of a case to an investigator until the date that the initial report of investigation was submitted: 58.

Standards Review & Quality Intervention Program

The Standards Review and Quality Intervention Program (QIP) is part of the Medical Board's confidential investigatory process; it is designed to address quality of care complaints. The Medical Board contracts with physicians, and other industry professionals to evaluate certain complaint allegations to determine if the minimal standard(s) of care has been provided to the patient. While some complaints are sent on for formal disciplinary action, most complaints evaluated by this section are resolved via non-disciplinary means.

This program focuses on intervention, with the goal to guide licensees who are beginning to show poor practice patterns or who are failing to keep up with changes in practice standards. With successful intervention, the licensee benefits by improving practice methods; patients benefit from having a better practitioner available to address their healthcare needs; and the Medical Board protects the public without an adverse impact on the availability of care in the community.

Currently, two nurses are employed by the Board to manage the complaints in the Standards Review section. From July 1, 2017, to June 30, 2018, the Standards Review and Quality Intervention section reviewed 576 complaints. It closed 413 complaints following review without taking any further action. Additionally, 113 licensees were referred to remedial education and/or were cautioned regarding their practice. As part of the review process, 912 subpoenas were issued.

Enforcement

Enforcement: Enforcement staff review the complaints referred to the section by the Board's Secretary and Supervising Member and prepare the cases for possible disciplinary action. Enforcement attorneys prepare citations, as well as Summary Suspensions, Immediate Suspensions and Automatic Suspensions. They also negotiate Consent Agreements and Voluntary Surrenders.

The enforcement priority code establishes a projected case development timeline that is based upon the type and complexity of the complaint. Cases with the greatest and most immediate potential for patient harm receive the most expeditious processing.

Compliance

The Medical Board's compliance staff monitored 300 licensees on probation in FY18. Probationers are usually required to attend periodic office conferences with the Board Secretary or designee to verify that the licensee is fulfilling the specific requirements of the Board Order or Consent Agreement. Compliance staff members participate in nearly 30 such conferences each month.

During FY18, the Medical Board approved 123 requests from licensees on probation for remedial education course approvals, chart review, or other modifications related to compliance with their Board sanction. The Board also approved the release of 56 licensees from the probationary terms and conditions included in their Board Order or Consent Agreement.

The compliance staff is also responsible for verifying that treatment providers, approved by the Board to provide services to licensees with chemical dependency issues, maintain compliance with the requirements in ORC 4731.25 and in OAC 4731-16. The list of approved treatment providers is available on the Medical Board's website, med.ohio.gov.

Administrative Hearings

Hearing Unit: The Medical Board's Attorney Hearing Examiners conduct the administrative hearings of practitioners who requested a hearing regarding a citation issued by the Medical Board. Following the conclusion of the administrative hearing, the Hearing Examiner prepares a Report & Recommendation that includes the basis for the hearing, the findings of fact, conclusions of law and a proposed disciplinary sanction for consideration by the Board members. During FY18, 29 administrative hearings were held.

In some situations, after having been notified of the citations issued by the Board, the practitioner does not request an administrative hearing. If that occurs, the Board can either act based upon the information in the citation, which often occurs in less complex cases, or it can request a Hearing Examiner review the Board's evidence to support the charges and prepare a Proposed Findings and Proposed Order, which includes a proposed disciplinary sanction for consideration by the Board members. It is similar in format to a Report and Recommendation, but there is no hearing and there is no evidence presented by the respondent, who waived his or her right to a hearing by failing to submit a hearing request. During FY18, the Hearing Examiners prepared 17 Proposed Findings and Proposed Orders.

The Attorney Hearing Examiners also preside at public rules hearings regarding administrative rules promulgated by the agency. They prepare a report of the hearing for consideration by the Board members. Four public rules hearings were held in FY18.

The Medical Board receives numerous requests for copies of public records each year. While many documents are available through the Medical Board's website, requests for more complex records are provided by the agency. FY18 yielded a 29% increase in the number of public records requests received and processed by the agency.

Requests for disciplinary action files, licensure files and Board meeting materials are the most frequently requested documents. A response to a public records request may require providing hundreds, and in a few cases, thousands of pages of material.

Education and Outreach Activities



The State Medical Board of Ohio, Ohio Department of Health, and State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy worked together to develop and run a public awareness campaign targeting prescribers, their patients and the general public. Take Charge Ohio is an initiative to help use pain medication safely and responsibly to minimize the risk of drug misuse, dependency and addiction. The campaign offers prescribers and other healthcare professionals the resources and tools to properly educate patients on safe medication and pain management practices. Take Charge Ohio also helps educate patients about the scope of the problem, its impact in Ohio, and how to take action.

Gov. John R. Kasich announced the campaign on 8/30/2017 during a press conference launching the Medical Board's new regulations for opioid prescriptions to treat acute pain (OAC 4731-11). The partnering agencies continued regional events in Columbus, Cleveland, Youngstown, Dayton, Toledo Cincinnati and Athens from September 2018 through April 2018.





HealthScene Ohio: The Medical Board continued production of its quarterly magazine that highlights the good work of the Board and Ohio's medical professionals. Distribution includes at least 70,000 of the Board's licensees, as well as 40,000 print copies sent around the state to health care locations accessible to the public. Because of a partnership with CityScene Media Group, the Board produces and distributes the magazine at zero cost to licensees. Feature stories for FY18 included Preventing Burnout: Helping medical professionals deal with stressors; Medical Ethics: What happens when health care professionals cross the line; and Fighting the Opioid Epidemic: How Ohio is working to combat the national opioid crisis.

Digital Communications

Website: The Medical Board website, med.ohio.gov, continues to evolve even after the redesign in FY17. New features include easier navigation to Board meeting agendas and minutes and added consumer focus with the addition of a quick link to file a complaint.
