

Cuyahoga River


The main branch of the Cuyahoga River begins at the confluence of the West Branch Cuyahoga and East Branch Cuyahoga rivers and flows 85 miles in a U-shaped course to Lake Erie in downtown Cleveland. Headwaters for the 15-mile West Branch and 15-mile East Branch begin in the neighboring townships of Hambden and Montville (Geauga County), respectively. Both branches begin less than 15 miles south of the Lake Erie shore; however, the Cuyahoga River flows nearly 60 miles south into Akron before curving northward toward its mouth. The watershed drains 813 square miles (520,320 acres).

The upper Cuyahoga River was once part of the Ohio River Watershed. The present-day Tuscarawas River, which rises in Akron and flows south into the Muskingum River and eventually the Ohio River, is the ancestral continuation of the upper Cuyahoga River. During the most recent glacial retreat, more than 12,000 years ago, the upper Cuyahoga was redirected north into the uncovered vestiges of a pre-glacial valley.

The name 'Cuyahoga' is an anglicized spelling of the Mohawk Indian word 'cayagaga' meaning "crooked river." In 1796, Moses Cleaveland and his Connecticut Land Company survey party reached the mouth of the Cuyahoga River and established the first settlement in the Western Reserve. This became the city of Cleveland.

Due to concerns that too much industrial and waste water contaminants had been discharged into the lower portion of the river, the Cuyahoga was federally designated an Area of Concern in 1985 (along with the Maumee, Black and Ashtabula rivers), prompting the foundation of the Cuyahoga River Remedial Action Plan (RAP). As a result of the RAP's efforts, water quality in the lower Cuyahoga is improving. In 1998 the Cuyahoga was recognized for shaping the nation's environmental, economic and cultural heritage by being federally designated as one of 14 American Heritage Rivers.

The Cuyahoga offers good northern pike, smallmouth bass and steelhead fishing. The upper 25 miles of the river system are designated as a State Scenic River. An additional 25-mile stretch of the river flows through Cuyahoga Valley National Park, Ohio's only National Park.



The 6.5-acre Rivergate Park is currently undeveloped vacant land. The Cleveland Metroparks owns 2.4 acres. Reclamation plans for Rivergate Park include the addition of a skate park, a canoe/kayak launch, outdoor classroom, restroom facilities and the Metroparks' Institute of the Great Outdoors (IGO). The launch will be the Metroparks' first watercraft access site on the Cuvahoga River. The IGO will provide outdoor recreational programming and training. The park is currently the new home of the Cleveland Rowing Foundation.

The Cleveland Metroparks' Ohio & Erie Canal Reservation spans a 6-mile stretch of the Cuyahoga River in Cuyahoga Heights and Valley View and is situated on the backlands of industrial properties which abut the river and canal. The reservation celebrates Cleveland's industrial heritage through interpretive signage, displays and overlook areas. Additionally, the northernmost remaining 4.4 miles of the 309-mile Ohio & Erie Canal enters the Metropark and provides fishing opportunities, wildlife and scenic viewing.

The 6.3-mile paved All Purpose Trail/Towpath Trail extends the length of the reservation, connecting access "gateways" at Harvard Avenue, the CanalWay Center, Bacci Park, West Canal Road and at Lock 39 (Rockside Road). The Towpath Trail, which follows the original Canal Towpath from 1827, continues south into the adjacent Cuyahoga Valley National Park. Three additional trails, the Six Mile Flats Loop Trail (0.3 miles) and the Lower 40 Loop Trail (0.6 miles), and a 2-mile mountain bike trail are also found at Ohio & Erie Canal Reservation (near the CanalWay Center Gateway).

Cuyahoga Valley National Park protects nearly 33,000 acres and includes over 25 miles of the Cuyahoga River. It is the largest public access site featured in the Lake Erie Public Access Guidebook - Rivers Edition. From north to south, the park is located in the communities of Independence, Valley View, Walton Hills, Brecksville, Sagamore Hills Township, Northfield Center Township, Boston Township, Richfield Township, Boston Heights, Peninsula, Cuyahoga Falls, Bath Township and Akron. The park is adjacent to the Cleveland Metroparks' Bedford, Brecksville and Ohio & Erie Canal reservations and is also adjacent to Summit County's Deep Lock Quarry, Furnace Run, Hampton Hills and O'Neil Woods metro parks.

In addition to preserving the natural splendor between the urban centers of Cleveland and Akron, the Cuyahoga Valley National Park protects and highlights the historic importance of the Cuyahoga River Valley. The park features the Towpath Trail, which follows the historic route of the Ohio & Erie Canal. From 1827 to 1861, the canal served as a major means for transporting goods between Lake Erie and the Ohio River. Many of the canal's locks remain in tact and are found along the Towpath.

There are many locations to access the Towpath, including the Lock 39, Station Road Bridge, Red Lock, Lock 29, Bolanz Road, Ira Road and Botzum trailheads. The Towpath continues north into the Ohio & Erie Canal Reservation of the Cleveland Metroparks and south into Sand Run and Cascade Valley metro parks, which serve Summit County. There are many other hiking and walking trails found within the park, including connecting pathways from adjacent reservations.

The Ohio & Erie Canalway Byway, designated in 1996 as a State Scenic Byway and federally in 2000 as one of America's Byways, follows Canal and Riverview roads through the park. The 110-mile Byway route travels from Cleveland to New Philadelphia in Tuscarawas County, and connects industrial hubs with historic canal-era communities and sites.

In partnership with Cuyahoga Valley National Park, the private non-profit Cuyahoga Valley Scenic Railroad provides a tour of the park by rail. The railroad is one of the country's longest and oldest scenic expeditions and travels between the Rockside Station in Independence and the Canton Station in the city of Canton. Stations within the park include (from north to south) the Canal Visitor Center, Brecksville, Boston Mill, Peninsula, Indigo Lake and Botzum.

Cuyahoga Valley National Park offers many more activities and amenities, including a bridle trail, cross-country skiing trails, picnic shelters and fishing areas. Brandywine Falls, Beaver Marsh, Ritchie Ledges and the Everett Road Covered Bridge are also points of interest.





Deep Lock Quarry Metro Park (Metro Parks, Serving Summit County) is contained within the boundaries of Cuyahoga Valley National Park and connects to the Ohio & Erie Canal Towpath Trail. The Metro Park features a remnant canal lock and an old quarry, which produced the large Berea Sandstone blocks needed to construct the lock, among other local structures.

Summit County's Cascade Valley Metro Park is divided into two disconnected tracts; a North section and a South section. The southern section is further divided into the Oxbow Area on the north side of the Cuyahoga River and the Chuckery Area on the river's south side. The southern section of Cascade Valley Metro Park marks the southernmost point in the Cuyahoga River's U-shaped course. For the Native Americans that once inhabited the area, this location marked the northernmost point of the canoe portage trail that linked the Cuyahoga and Tuscarawas rivers. A remaining natural landmark of this trail is the Indian Signal Tree, a large and uniquely shaped Bur Oak tree at the Chuckery Area.

Cascade Valley Metro Park is connected to Sand Run (via the Ohio & Erie Canal Towpath Trail) and Gorge (via the 3.2-mile Highbridge Trail) metro parks to the north and east, respectively.







The long-defunct amusement park operated between the 1880s and 1912 and featured a dance hall and roller coaster. Much of the park's appeal centered on the trails leading into the gorge and the impressive geologic spectacles. Construction of the hydroelectric dam downriver (at present-day Gorge Metro Park) resulted in the current 34-acre reservoir, which in turn inundated the amusement

The 86-acre Tummonds State Nature Preserve is best accessible by canoe from the Cuyahoga River. Additional access can be found from the Mantua Rotary Club's Glacial Esker Trail, located near the wastewater treatment plant on Line Street. There are no trails or other amenities at Tummonds, but visitors may explore the preserve without a permit. Tummonds was the first designated scenic river preserve (1986) and protects 1.5 miles of the Upper Cuyahoga State Scenic River.



The Portage Park District's Headwaters Trail is an 8-mile limestone-paved trail that follows the course of the former Cleveland-Mahoning Railroad. It connects Mantua and Garrettsville. Between State Route 44 and State Route 700, the Headwaters Trail crosses the Lake Erie-Ohio River watershed divide.

A connecting trail to Gerald E. Buchert Memorial Park along the north side of the river is accessible from the Mill Street Access.





The City of Akron (Summit County) began purchasing land in Geauga County in 1932 for water supply purposes. Headwaters Park is a 926-acre property that is leased by the Geauga Park District from the city of Akron. It features the 420-acre East Branch Reservoir, which is Akron's northernmost water supply basin. Perservoir provides fishing access (permitted from boats and limited to designated areas along the shore), as well as a boat launch at the Crystal Lake Picnic Area.
