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I. Forest Overview

The Eastern State Forests include five state forests: Harrison, Fernwood, Yellow Creek, Beaver Creek and Willow Grove. The headquarters office for the Eastern State Forests is located at Fernwood State Forest. *For locations, refer to Appendix A.*

A substantial portion of the land in Fernwood and Harrison state forests has been strip mined for coal. However, the production of acid mine water is minimal because of the neutralizing effect of limestone deposits. The majority of unstripped lands is located on ridges and is in forest cover. Subsequent reforestation and installation of recreation facilities, funded through the Appalachian Regional Development Act of 1965 and the Ohio Capital Improvements program, have restored the area to a beautiful, healthy forest, providing visitors with many outdoor recreational opportunities. Reforestation efforts have occurred on various reclaimed strip mine areas on these two forests

Yellow Creek State Forest adjoins the Highlandtown Wildlife Area in Columbiana County. The land for Yellow Creek was purchased between 1947-1960. There are no developed facilities on Yellow Creek State Forest.

In 1998, ODNR acquired 1,122 acres near Calcutta, Ohio in Columbiana County that became Beaver Creek State Forest. The need for accommodating diverse outdoor recreation coupled with the protection of the unique Little Beaver Creek watershed were primary factors in establishing Ohio's 20th state forest under the multiple use management philosophy of the ODNR Division of Forestry.

In 2018, ODNR acquired 350 acres near Saint Clairsville, Ohio in Belmont County that became Willow Grove Forest. There are no developed facilities on Willow Grove Forest.

II. Resource Management

All proposed harvest activity is reviewed by a cross-sectional group of DOF staff to determine which harvests are best suited for stumpage sales and for forest product sales. These recommendations are then provided to the chief for consideration and final decision. Harvests will be accomplished using a combination of stumpage sales and product sales as defined below.

Prescription Cruising:

The purpose of prescription cruising is to monitor the health and silvicultural needs of the forest based on Division of Forestry goals. The cruises will follow a stand-based cruising model. The U.S. Forest Service, research developed, OAK SILVAH decision support system will be used as the primary reference to develop prescriptions for oak stands. In the next year, the Division has identified the following parcels for prescription cruising. *See Appendix B for map.*

Stumpage Sales:

Stumpage sales are sales of standing trees. The following stumpage sales are marked are proposed to be sold in the upcoming fiscal year.

Forest Product Sales:

Harvesting through forest product sales consists of hiring contract loggers or utilizing state crews to deliver whole trees (stringers) to a central location for processing, sorting and selling of products. These products will be sold through a competitive bid process.

High Conservation Value Forest Monitoring:

Maintaining and promoting the features that make areas designated HCVMs are important to the Division of Forestry. Approximately 200 acres of HCVM at Beaver Creek State Forest in Section 25 of St. Clair Township are planned to be monitored this year.

Minerals:

A substantial portion of the land at Fernwood and Harrison state forests has been strip mined for coal. The state does not own subsurface rights for much of these properties as they were severed prior to state surface ownership.

Invasives:

Non-native invasive species such as ailanthus, bush honeysuckle, multi-flora rose and autumn olive in areas at Fernwood and Harrison state forests will be targeted for control as they are encountered. These invasive species, especially ailanthus, will need to be killed in and around the timber sales at Fernwood and Harrison to prevent the invasion into the openings created during the sales. Ailanthus stands will be monitored for presence of Verticillium Wilt, a beneficial biological control agent.

Boundary:

There are approximately 70 miles of boundary lines around the Eastern Forests. With a 5-year rotation schedule, approximately 15 miles of boundary will be

inspected and repainted as needed each year.

Licenses/Leases:

Beaver Creek State Forest: Abandoned Railroad ROW license agreement with Columbiana County Park District for the development of a recreational trail.

Insects & Disease:

Ash trees being killed by the emerald ash borer will be salvaged where possible. Staff will continue to monitor for gypsy moth and hemlock woolly adelgid on the state forest units.

Utilization & Marketing:

Firewood permits will be issued on a request basis for downed trees along roadways, trails and facilities.

Certification

The Division of Forestry will continue third party dual certification under the Forest Stewardship Council® (FSC®) and the Sustainable Forestry Initiative® (SFI®) standards. Surveillance audits will be conducted in the fall of 2020.

Research:

There are no research projects currently on any eastern region state forests.

Summary (2-3 year projects):

Most of the above projects are ongoing and are expected to last several years. Land management activities will continue depending on recommendations from foresters. Recent reforestation efforts on over 200 acres at Harrison and Fernwood state forests will be monitored. Invasive species control will need to be implemented in these areas.

III. Maintenance

Buildings:

Perform general maintenance, routine cleaning, and repair to the 9 buildings and structures located at Fernwood and Harrison state forests.

Infrastructure (water, wastewater, utilities):

No major repairs are planned or anticipated.

Roads:

Approximately 30 miles of limited access roads are annually inspected at Fernwood and Harrison state forests. GPS and inventory all access roads in the eastern forests.

Dams:

Harrison State Forest has one class III dam, Ronsheim Dam, that will be monitored throughout the year. The Division will cut and treat woody vegetation on the dams located at Fernwood and Harrison state forests.

Grounds:

- Grounds maintenance will primarily consist of mowing all public areas and brush removal at campgrounds.
- Latrines and trash containers maintained at all campground areas.

Capitals Projects:

- There are no major capital improvement projects planned.

Summary (2-3 year future projects):

Future projects other than those listed above include:

- Construction of parking lot area along Little Beaver Creek at

Beaver Creek State Forest for canoe access.

IV. Recreation

Trails (bridle, hiking, etc.):

There are approximately 26 miles of combined bridle and hiking trails at Harrison State Forest and a three-mile hiking trail at Fernwood State Forest.

- Continue addressing eroded areas and poorly drained sections of trails at Fernwood and Harrison.
- Continue to monitor RR tunnel project area for erosion.
- Make minor trail reroutes to improve aesthetics & avoid poorly drained sections of hiking trail at Fernwood and bridle trail at Harrison.

Bridle Trail Seasonal Closure:

Bridle Trails are very popular with visitors to Ohio's state forests. That's why it is important that the Division of Forestry manage these trails in a way that allows them to be sustained for the long term. The Division of Forestry has decided that a seasonal trail closure, which would minimize traffic during the wettest months of the year, will help protect these trails. Seasonal trail closure during wet periods is a common management technique used by many public agencies to minimize negative impacts.

Feedback from Division of Forestry annual open house meetings, together with feedback gathered by email, was provided to our management committee. This feedback helped them to understand how and when these trails are most valuable to bridle trail users and was considered in making the decision about seasonal trail closures.

The date for the bridle trail closure for this winter season will be January 3, 2022. The date to reopen the trails has not been determined, but it will be no later than the first Friday in April. When the reopening date is determined, it will be posted.

During this closure period, the trails can be more safely maintained by forest staff and organizations with approved volunteer agreements. The trails will be monitored to safely remove debris and hazardous trees. Where needed and appropriate, dozer work for trail stability, soil erosion control and trail tread rehabilitation can safely occur as weather conditions allow.

Signage will be installed at the campgrounds and day-use areas that will designate the trails as open or closed. Gates will be installed at the camps as needed. Additional signage will be put on the horse trails that can be accessed from roads.

Trail rides can be requested during the closed season. The applicant will need to complete a [Special Use Permit](#) (SUP) application and submit it to the local forest manager at least 5 working days prior to the event. This will provide adequate time for the Division of Forestry to evaluate and potentially approve the SUP.

Campgrounds:

Fernwood State Forest has one campground, Hidden Hollow Campground, with 22 family campsites equipped with picnic tables, fire rings and vault latrines. Campers must provide their own water and self-register at the campground.

Harrison State Forest has two campground areas equipped with picnic tables, fire rings, and vault latrines. Ronsheim Campground has seven camp sites; Trailriders Campground has 20 sites accommodating family and/or horse campers. Campers must provide their own water, and self-register at the campground.

Shooting Ranges:

There is one shooting range at Harrison State Forest and three shooting ranges at Fernwood State Forest, including one trap shoot range, one pistol range, and one rifle range.

- New improvement to shooting ranges have been constructed with contractors and Division of Wildlife at Fernwood and Harrison state forests. These extensive improvements include covered benches, ballistic sand, and handicapped access.
- The shooting benches will be repaired and repainted as needed.

Summary (2-3 year future projects)

- Coordinate trail development at Beaver Creek State Forest.
- Continue trail improvement work at Fernwood and Harrison state forests.

V. Wildland Fire

Suppression:

- The Division of Forestry shall aggressively suppress wildland fire starts within each state forest.
- During extreme fire danger periods, stage available resources and equipment at predetermined location, notify local fire departments of availability status, and respond as needed/requested.

Prevention:

- The Division of Forestry will promote wildfire prevention programs through local fire departments utilizing Smokey's "A Fire Prevention Teachers Workbook."
- We plan to participate in at least three fire prevention educational opportunities each year.

- We will promote roadside Fire Danger signs in Jefferson, Columbiana, and Harrison counties.

Prescribed Fire:

No prescribed fires are proposed for the upcoming fiscal year.

Interagency Fire Crew:

- Eastern Forest staff members will be encouraged to participate in the Division’s Inter-Agency Fire Crew program as the workload and budget allow.

Training:

- Offer and provide Basic Wildfire Suppression training to VFD’s in Columbiana, Carroll, Harrison, Tuscarawas, Belmont, Guernsey, and Jefferson counties (1/County)

Fire Department Contacts:

- Attend a minimum of one VFD Association meeting per year in each county in the fire protection district.
- Work with fire departments to utilize the online fire reporting system.
- Update fire department data sheets.
- Forest Manager is lead for southern portion and Fire Forester is lead for northeast portion:

Firewise:

- Continue to promote the Firewise program within the Eastern Forests Fire Protection Area.

Federal Excess Personal Property (FEPP)/Firefighter Property (FFP):

- Continue to complete annual inspections of federal property within our fire protection project.
- Continue to promote the participation of fire departments in the FEPP and FFP.

Grants:

- Promote grant opportunities to area fire departments

Summary (2-3 year) future projects:

The Eastern Forests Fire Protection Area covers thirteen counties and has a moderate-severe wildland fire problem, with a potential serious threat to “values” (property/infrastructure) within the Wildland-Urban Interface. Continue the goal of supporting and assisting the cooperating fire departments within the fire protection area with prevention activities, wildland fire suppression and wildland fire training. Continue assisting fire departments with online fire reporting system.

VI. Law Enforcement

Due to re-organization, the Division of Forestry’s Law Enforcement staff was transferred to the Division of Parks in Fiscal Year 2013. These officers continue to enforce laws on state forests, as well as continuing to investigate and enforce Ohio’s wildfire laws.

Programs:

State forest staff supports and plans to continue participating in the Fernwood State Forest Outdoor Days. The program provides environmental education to 5th graders of Jefferson County and is coordinated and sponsored by the Jefferson County Soil and Water Conservation District.

A BMP demonstration area has been recently developed at Fernwood State Forest. The site will serve as a training area for Ohio loggers as part of their Master Logger training through the Ohio Forestry Association. Forest staff will participate and coordinate trainings in the spring and fall every year.

Summary (2-3 year future projects):

Information and Education about forest resources in Ohio is an ongoing

component of the Division of Forestry. In addition to continuing previous events and partnerships: Revise and print new forest maps for Harrison, Beaver Creek and Yellow Creek state forests.

IX. Budget

Operational Budget

The FY2022 operational budget allocated to state forest units covers the general expenses necessary to the operation of the particular state forest. State forest managers and staff purchase supplies, services and equipment to keep the forest unit running, and report all expenditures.

Revenue:

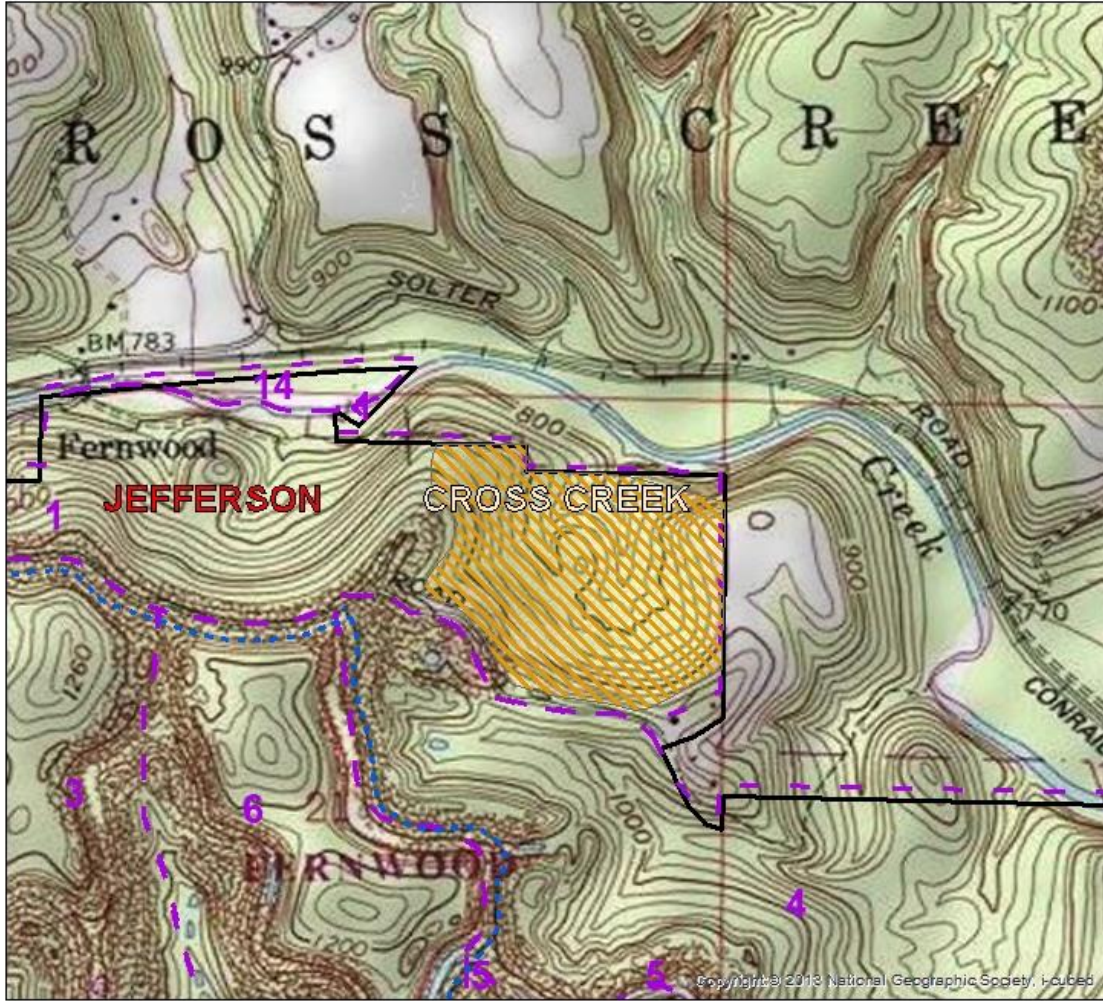
Revenue is generated from timber and product sales, firewood permits and special use permit application fees. A percentage of timber sale income is returned to the local township, county, and local school district through the “Trees to Textbooks” Program. A portion of the timber revenue kept by the Division of Forestry is utilized to pay fire departments for each wildland fire report that is submitted. These reports are generated by the fire department for each fire response that they conduct.
