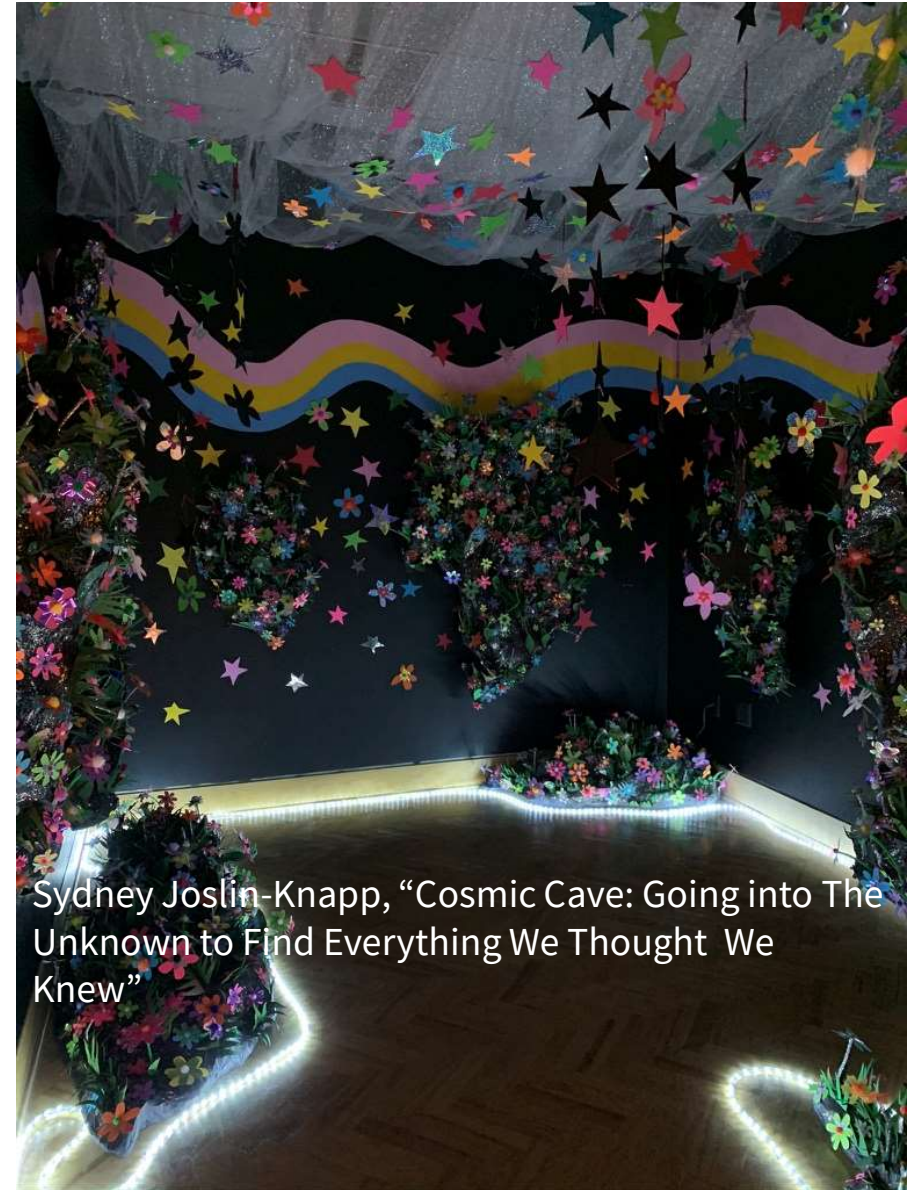




Look again at *Mountains to Climb*, what can you tell about the way it was made?



Sydney Joslin-Knapp used a whole room to create their “Cosmic Cave.” What do you think they wanted to you to feel inside the room?

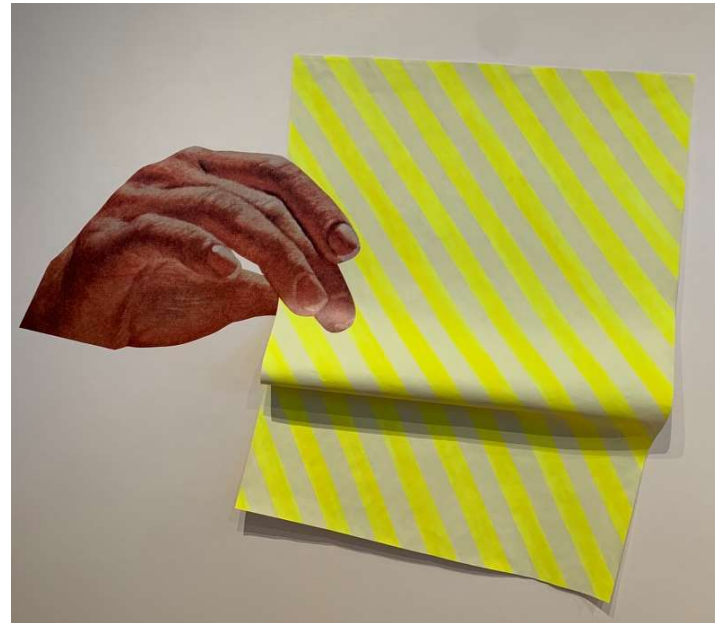

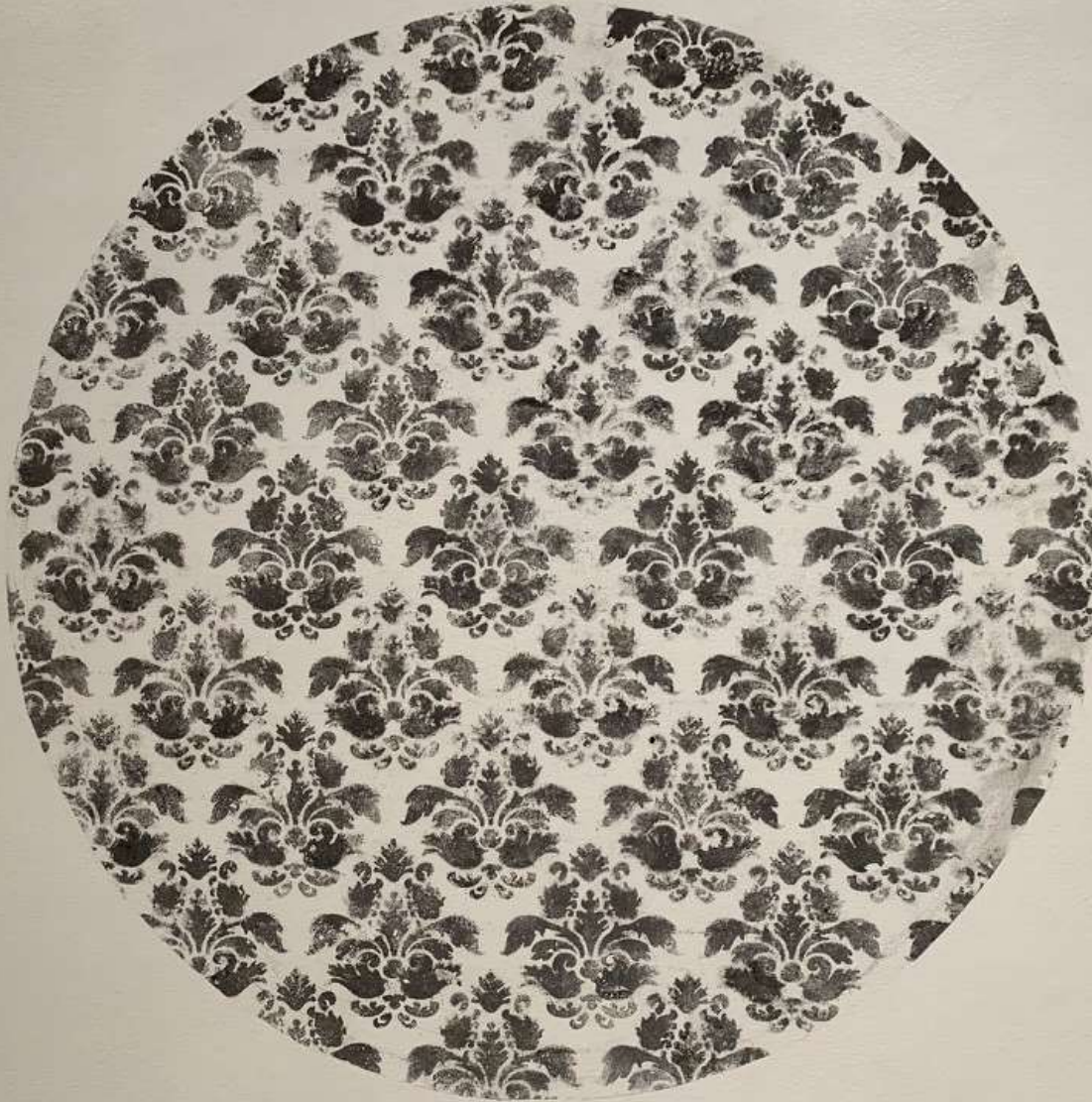

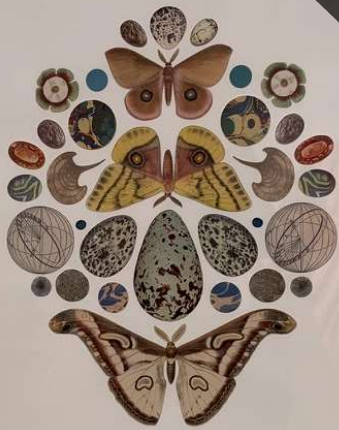
What connection exists between hands and paper? What kinds of paper do you like to touch? Are there any kinds of paper that feel strange or that you don't like?

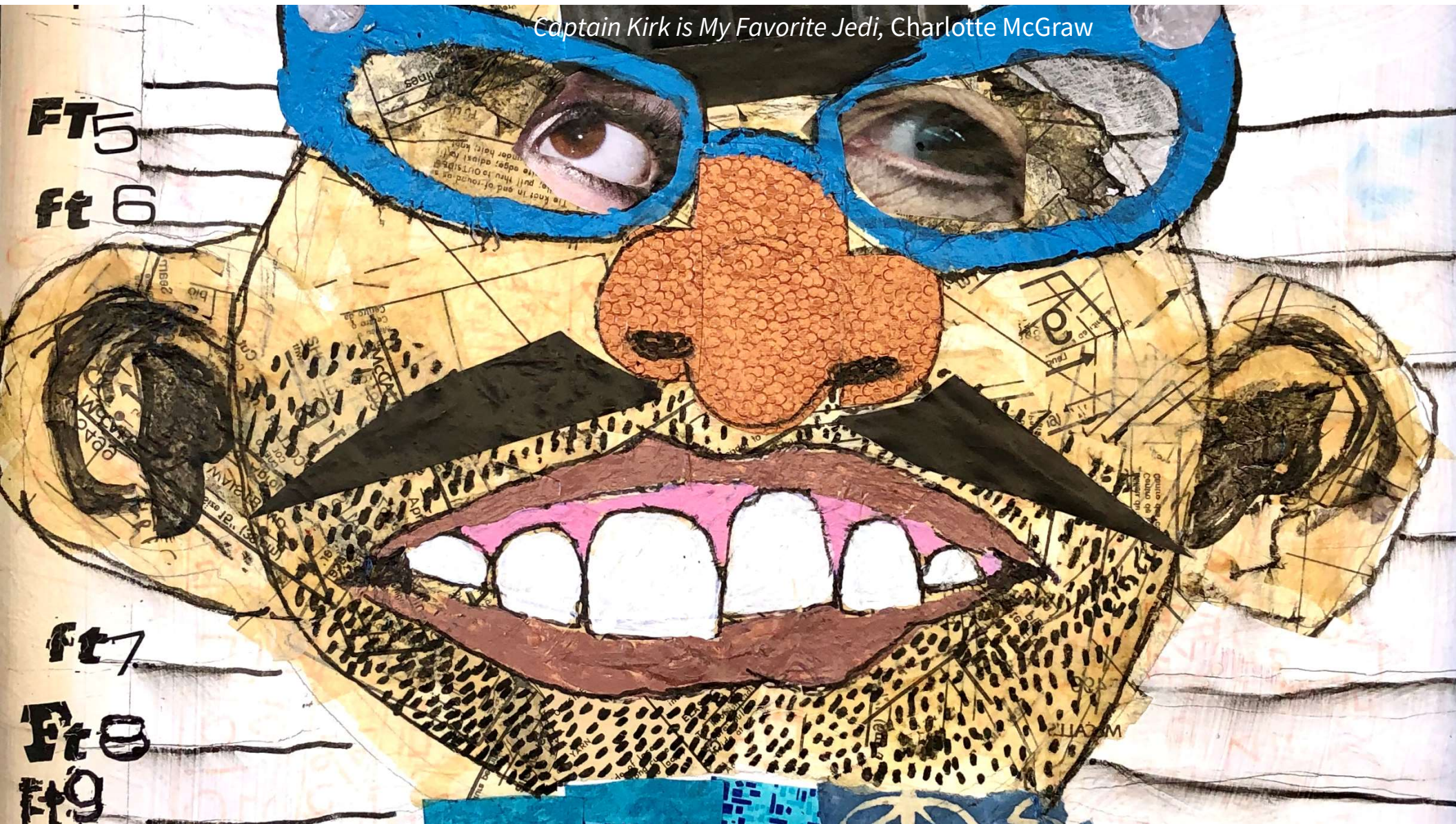

Collages: Try it at home!

Materials:

- Paper, newspaper, receipts, wrappers, magazines, postcards... Look around! There's paper hiding everywhere 😊
- A strong surface, like heavy paper, cardboard, posterboard
- Scissors or an Exact-o blade (if you're old enough)
- Glue, matte medium, ModPodge, tape
- Drawing and Embellishing Materials: Pens, pencils, colored pencils, pastels, glitter, buttons, stickers, fabric... anything small and lightweight enough to glue!

- Charlotte Builds Her Characters Step by Step:

- She selects her body shape and glues it first.
- She glues down the head shape next.
- If her character is holding something, it goes down and the hands are glued on top it.
- She then glues down the facial features... eyes, nose, ears, teeth, glasses
- And don't forget the HAIR! Charlotte has a lot of fun with silly hair.
