## Updates from the State Librarian

- October was all about the search for the next State Librarian of Ohio. On October 28, after a series of interviews and presentations by candidates, the State Library Board appointed Mandy Knapp as State Librarian, effective December 31, 2024. Mandy brings extensive experience working in public libraries, academic libraries, prior experience at the State Library, and OPLIN, to her new role. She is currently the Manager of the Uptown Branch of the Westerville Public Library, where she is helping to lead the library's migration to the CLC consortium.
- We are investigating the possibility of relocating to a space more suited to the current and future needs of the State Library. To that end, a site visit was made to the Smith Building (connected to the Conference Center) on the OCLC Campus in Dublin. There are many positives about this space, but unfortunately, it is not well suited to the needs of the State Library.

## **Know Your Flow Ohio**


- The State Library of Ohio, in partnership with the Network of the National Library of Medicine (NNLM) Region 6, is pleased to announce the <u>Know Your Flow Ohio (KYFO) Grant</u> program. The purpose of the KYFO Grant is to help public libraries address period poverty for patrons within their communities.
  - Fifteen public libraries will be awarded the grant. Each library selected will receive one menstrual product dispenser along with menstrual hygiene supplies from Aunt Flow. As part of this special grant program, these libraries will also receive \$1,000 to acquire additional Aunt Flow supplies and create health programs focused on menstrual hygiene, education, and menopausal health information. Libraries are encouraged to collaborate with local public health districts, universities, clinics, and other healthcare providers to organize presentations, panels, programs, or outreach events. Educational resources can be found at KnowYourFlow.Info, a platform created by the <u>NNLM Region 6</u> and Aunt Flow to enhance awareness of menstrual health.
  - Applications are due November 17, 2024, and must be completed in one sitting.
  - The Know Your Flow Ohio grant program is supported in-part with federal funding awarded to the State Library from the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) provided by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and in partnership with Network of the National Library of Medicine (NNLM) Region 6.

## LSTA

- The State Library of Ohio's LSTA Conservation and Preservation Grant award recipients have been selected and announced. Fifteen (15) libraries were recommended to receive a total of \$68,386.00 in LSTA funds for a wide range of preservation projects. Funded projects will include a collection of over 40 Civil War letters, a variety of documents related to the Wright brothers and their family, a scrapbook documenting the later years of Cincinnati painter Elizabeth Nourse, and a set of sculptures (*Black Family of Man*) by Cleveland artist Alan T. Purcell. Those awarded funding will have from November 1, 2024 August 31, 2025, to complete their projects. The Conservation and Preservation grant is offered with the support of the Ohio Preservation Council and provides qualifying libraries up to \$4,999.00 to conserve a single item or small, discrete group of items within their collections.
- The State Library of Ohio's LSTA Competitive Grant application window closed on November 3 with awards to be announced in December. The LSTA Competitive Grant offers eligible libraries the opportunity to apply for up to \$50,000.00 in LSTA funds for projects that address one of three possible focus areas: Literacy, Library as Community Anchor, and Outreach and Engagement. - The State Library Ohio's LSTA Open Grant initiative has been relaunched and moved to a wholly
  online format with a new, streamlined set of application questions. It also directs applicants submit
  proposals that align with the goals set out in the State Library's LSTA Five-Year Plan. The LSTA Open
  Grant program is designed to offer flexibility, while supporting libraries as they address a specific need
  within their community. Project proposals for up to \$4999.00 may be submitted by eligible applicants
  at any time throughout the year. For more information visit:

- The <u>Ohio Collection Analysis Initiative</u> (OCAI) is an original, self-paced, collection analysis tool for considering collections that empower children and young adult readers by respecting and appreciating what makes them different and the same. OCAI is a collaborative project of the State Library of Ohio and TeachingBooks.net. # **Ohio Digital Library**

- In the month of October, ODL patrons checked out 843,915 items. The total for 2024 stands at 8,556,464 checkouts.
  - The most popular non-magazine title in October was *Pretty Girls*, by Karin Slaughter—a perpetually-popular thriller. The most popular magazine title was *The New Yorker*.
- In mid-March 2020, ODL enabled the opportunity for Ohioans to take advantage of the Overdrive Instant Digital Card. A user can sign up with his/her phone number and gain quick access to e-content via ODL. Users that sign up via the Instant Digital Card will be directed to their local library to fill out a physical library card. In October 2024, 3,402 registrations took place.

# Ohio Digital Network [Digital Public Library of America (DPLA) Project]

- The State Library of Ohio hosted the 6<sup>th</sup> annual ODNFest on October 3, 2024. ODNFest is an opportunity for library and museum digitization professionals to gather to explore current and relevant digitization topics. The ODNFest name comes from the Ohio Digital Network (ODN), Ohio's Digital Public Library of America (DPLA) service hub. Over 40 library professionals attended ODNFest.

### Ohio Ready to Read

- Ohio Ready to Read provides library-oriented resources on the <u>science of reading</u>, including webinar recordings, articles, and other tools to help public librarians and library workers learn about the science of reading and ways that public libraries support reading acquisition. This resource collection is part of ORTR's <u>Kindergarten Readiness and Student Learning</u> guide for Ohio public libraries.



state providing playback equipment to eligible blind, visually impaired, and print disabled residents.

## Summer Library Program

- The 2025 <u>Collaborative Summer Library Program</u> (CSLP) theme will be Art, with the slogan "Color Our World / Colorea Nuestro Mundo" and featuring artwork by <u>Mike Mullan</u>.
- The access code for the 2025 CSLP program manual was emailed to a summer library program point person at every Ohio public library system on October 16. The CSLP manual is made available to every Ohio public library building and is fully supported by federal LSTA funds administered by the State Library of Ohio. Libraries requiring CSLP manuals in paper or USB flash drive may purchase these formats from the <u>CSLP shop</u>. Such purchases are at the library's discretion and are not covered by LSTA funds. The online manual includes the complete program manual, all artwork and downloadables, and additional resources not available in the static manual formats.
- A <u>preliminary 2024 Ohio Summer Library Program report</u> is now available. A fuller report, including photos, anecdotes, and analysis from Ohio librarians, will be available by year's end.
- The 2026 CSLP program slogan will be "Unearth a Story" (theme of Dinosaurs / Archaeology / Paleontology).
- The 2027 CSLP program slogan will be "Mysteries Await at Your Library" (theme of Mystery / Detective / Suspense) and the 2028 theme will be Mythical Creatures. These were selected by vote of the CSLP state reps at the CSLP annual meeting in late August 2024, informed by library worker input via two national surveys. Thank you to the 385 Ohio library workers who completed the national survey for 2027 slogan and the 340 who completed the 2028 theme survey!
