Title: Ethical Guidelines for Contact Lens Dispensing: When to Refer

Jane S. Buckland, FNAO, FCLSA (H), NCLE (AC)

Course Description:

This 2 hour course provides information necessary to prevent, and/or observe possible Lens related complications which could result from dispensing pre-packaged Soft Contact Lenses. A brief history of soft contact lenses as well as a review of basic ocular anatomy and physiology will be addressed. An explanation of basic soft, toric, multifocal and scleral lens design, modalities, fitting, follow up and possible complications will be presented. Approved lens care and possible contraindications will be covered as well. Outlining the duties and responsibilities of the Contact Lens Dispenser will be discussed.

III. How Lens Care Effects the Eye Care Professional

(15 min)

A. Compliance

- 1. The CL dispenser is not directly responsible for lens care and maintenance instruction
- 2. However, it is their responsibility to verify the patient has been given proper instruction by their ECP
- B. "No Harm Events"
 - 1. Prescription written incorrectly
 - 2. Patient not given appropriate or incomplete wearing schedule
 - 3. Patient ignoring potential over wear signs and symptoms
- C. Beware of dispensing a lens to the wrong person or excessive ordering

IV. Young Adult Wearers "Y.A.W."

(5 min)

- A. The younger patient has the potential to be less compliant. possibility of a potential "falsified" Rx.
- B. YAWs have been known to "sell" their prescriptions to friends and others.

V. Swimming or showering in Contact Lenses

VIII. Lens Care: Soft

A. Multi-Purpose

- 1. The proportion of the microbial flora killed depends on the concentration of the disinfectant and the inherent resistance of the microorganism.
- 2. A store brand may be designated as a "multi-purpose" disinfecting solution most patients are unaware of the actual chemical components.
- 3. Not all solutions labeled as "disinfecting" are the same
- B. Chemical disinfectants are ranked according to their ability to inactivate pathogens
- C. Sterilization
 - 1. Most commonly accomplished by dry and or moist heat.
 - 2. The intention is to reduce microbial counts
- D. Hydrogen peroxide
 - 1. Hydrogen peroxide may prove to be useful as a surface cleaning agent because it remains active in the presence of organic matter
 - 2. Bio-cidal efficacy is yet to be determined on instruments

X. Artificial tears/lubricants

(5 min)

- A. Advise the patient not to mix brands!
- B. If the patient wears soft lenses and uses an AT intended or GPs it is possible that an adverse reaction could occur

XI. Saline

(5 min)

- A. Saline was first introduced in the 60's as part of the neutralizing process for the initial peroxide disinfection systems
- B. It was also used to ship and store soft lenses. Saline was also used to rinse and store soft lenses for heat disinfection

XII. Daily Wear Disposables

(5 min)

- A. Are less likely to cause problems with soilage and lens deposition.
- B. Make certain lens care instruction accompanied by a lens care sample kit are provided

XIII. Diagnostic Soft Trial Lens Disinfection

(5 min)

- A. To date there is no direct Statement from the FDA regarding what is the most "effective"
- B. Rely on manufacturer recommendation



Complaints by Status Level (11 total complaints)




Complaints by Priority and Status (11 total complaints)

Investigator Activities

Enforcement

The investigator for the Ohio Vision Professionals Board serves the public through enforcement of the Ohio Revised Code (ORC) and Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) sections related to the practices of optometry, opticianry, ocularistry and registering optician apprentices. Other primary functions of the investigator include the examination and resolution of complaints, unannounced site inspections, profession inquiries and reviewing advertisements of practices throughout the state. The inspections ensure compliance with applicable laws and rules relating to the professions in protecting the public. During inspections, the investigator focuses on the overall condition of the office, equipment requirements and other practice related matters. Board decisions on discipline and administrative hearings are entered into the National Practitioners Data Bank (NPDB). The investigator presents laws and rules training sessions accompanied with a proficiency test for newly graduated optometrists and doctors seeking licensure in Ohio from other states.

Statistics of Investigative Complaints and Inspections

PRIORITY LEVEL – A level assigned to each complaint illustrating the amount of investigation efforts necessary to resolve the complaint.

- **High** Review by board member and AAG, interviews complainant, respondent, and witnesses, obtains reports, may include inspection, collection and assembling evidence, and usually ends in consent agreement or a higher resolve.



For the Part I, II and III exams, the possible scaled scores range from 100-900, with 100 being the lowest score possible and 900 being the highest score possible. For each of these exams, candidates scoring 300 or above are considered to pass.

Section scores are reported on a completely different scale than Part scores. Therefore, the sum of section scaled scores is not likely to equal a Part scaled score. The highest possible section score is a 99.
