Board Meeting Minutes of Thursday, August 12, 2021

The Regular Business Meeting of the Ohio Vision Professionals Board was called to order at 9:35 a.m, held at the Vern Riffe Center, 77 South High St., 31st Floor, Columbus, OH 43215.

#### **BOARD MEMBERS IN ATTENDANCE:**

Cheryl Archer, O.D., Thomas Barracato, Jacqueline Davis, O.D., Darrell Dye, O.D., Mark A. Gibson, Brian J Miller, and Thomas E. Nye, O.D. A roll call was taken by Thomas Barracato to verify all members in attendance.

#### **STAFF MEMBERS IN ATTENDANCE:**

Marlene Anielski, Executive Director, Crystal Richie, AAG, Gary Price, Investigator, Adela Lopez-Wellman, Administrative Professional, and Jordan Bare, Administrative Professional. The staff listed verbally identified themselves.

President Davis requested any guest to identify themselves.

#### **GUESTS IN ATTENDANCE:**

Executive Director Keith Kerns, Esq., OOA, President John Bruening, OAO, and President David Corey, PACA. The guests listed verbally identified themselves.

#### **ORDERING OF THE AGENDA:**

Brian Miller moved to accept the agenda for the August 12, 2021 meeting as written. Dr. Cheryl Archer, OD seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken by Thomas Barracato. The motion passed unanimously.

#### **APPROVAL OF MINUTES:**

Thomas Barracato moved to accept into record the draft minutes of the May 13, 2021 Ohio Vision Professionals Board meeting. Dr. Thomas Nye, OD seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken by Thomas Barracato. The motion passed unanimously.



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#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

President Davis welcomed all guests. President Davis further stated that the board said goodbye to Wilma Simmons and welcomed Jordan Bare. The board also welcomed Mark A. Gibson to the board. Crystal Richie, AAG, was also welcomed to the board.

#### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT:**

#### **LEGISLATION:**

#### **Enacted:**

- HB 263 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> General Assembly (GA) became effective April 12, 2021. It revises occupational licensing restrictions applicable to individuals convicted of criminal offenses. The bill would enact the "Fresh Start Act of 2019." Requires within 180 days, October 9, 2021, after the bill's effective date, a list of criminal offenses be adopted for which a conviction disqualifies licensure. The bill applies to every profession or occupation for which a license issued or conferred by a state licensing authority is required. Exempt occupations only include peace officer basic training certificates. An annual report is required for the director of administrative services with information about the number of accepted and denied applications and a listing of criminal offenses of individuals approved and denied licenses. The first report is due October 4, 2021 and includes the required information from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2020.
- HB 352 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> GA became effective April 15, 2021. It modifies civil rights laws relating to employment.
- HB 404 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> GA became effective November 22, 2020. It is to continue essential
  operations of virtual meetings of state and local governments in response to the declared
  pandemic and global health emergency related to COVID 19 until July 1, 2021. An
  amendment was added to extend certain agency license deadlines until July 1, 2021.
- SB 178 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> GA became effective March 2, 2021. It is regarding the authority of podiatrists to administer influenza vaccinations.
- SB 331 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> GA became effective April 12, 2021. It is to implement the
  recommendations of the Sunset Review Committee, comprised of senators and
  representative, by terminating or renewing various agencies four years more or less after
  the effective date of the act that established the agency. The VPB may be reviewed in the
  first year of the 134<sup>th</sup> GA, which is the year 2021. It requires a Sunset Review Committee
  to be convened during each General Assembly.
- HB 5 becomes effective September 28, 2021. It is to modify the requirements that may be met for licensure as a chemical dependency counselor II and to modify the professionals who may supervise certain individuals providing prevention services.
- HB 6 became effective May 14, 2021. It is to modify the laws governing certain health professionals and educator programs due to COVID-19 and other circumstances; to amend the version of section 4729.92 of the ORC that is scheduled to take effect on October 9,



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2021, to continue the changes to that section on and after that date; and to declare an emergency.

- HB 252 becomes effective September 28, 2021. It is to enter into the Audiology / Speech-Language Pathology Interstate Compact.
- SB 2 became effective August 3, 2021. It is to enter into the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact (PSYPACT) and make changes to the requirement for competency evaluation and mental health treatment in criminal cases.
- SB 3 becomes effective September 28, 2021. It is to enter into the Nurse Licensure Compact and to revise the law governing occupational license restrictions for individuals convicted of criminal offenses.
- SB 5 became effective June 29, 2021. It is to enter into the Physical Therapy Licensure Compact.
- SB 6 becomes effective September 28, 2021. It is to enter into the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact and to revise the law governing nurse aide training and competency evaluation programs, and to make an appropriation.
- SB 7 became effective June 29, 2021. It is to enter into the Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact.

#### **Current 134th General Assembly Bills:**

- HB 21 is in the Senate Transportation Committee. It is to increase the annual contribution
  for the "Donate Life" license plate and the requested contributions to the Second Change
  Trust Fund and to provide additional opportunities for Ohio residents to register as an organ
  donor.
- HB 43 is in the House Government Oversight Committee. It is to authorize public bodies to meet via teleconference and video conference.
- HB 52 was withdrawn on February 5, 2021. It is to allow municipalities, townships, and counties to establish minimum wage requirements higher than the state minimum wage.
  - o Same as SB 51 and is in the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee.
- HB 69 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to increase the state minimum wage.
- HB 81 is in the Senate. It is to make changes to the laws governing massage establishments and massage therapy.
  - Same as SB 55 and is in the Senate Health Committee.
- HB 88 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to require commercial roofing contractors to have a license.
  - Same as SB 64 and is in the Senate Government Oversight and Reform Committee.
- HB 103 is in the House State and Local Government Committee. It is regarding the adoption and duration of emergency administrative rules.
- HB 122 is in the Senate Health Committee. It is regarding the provision of telehealth services. Sec. 4725.35. An optometrist who holds a therapeutic pharmaceutical agents certificate issued under this chapter may provide telehealth services in accordance with



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section 4743.09 of the Revised Code. . . . 4743.09. (A) As used in this section: (1) "Durable medical equipment" means a type of equipment, such as a remote monitoring device utilized by a physician, . . that can withstand repeated use, is primarily and customarily used to serve a medical purpose, . . . includes repair and replacement parts for the equipment. . . . (3) "Health care professional" means: . . . (b) An optometrist licensed under Revised Code to practice optometry under a therapeutic Chapter 4725. of the pharmaceutical agents certificate; . . . (4) "Health care professional licensing board" means any of the following: . . . (b) The state vision professionals board; . . . (6) "Telemedicine Telehealth services" has the same meaning as in section 3902.30 of the Revised Code means health care services provided through the use of information and communication technology by a health care professional, within the professional's scope of practice, who is located at a site other than the site where either of the following is located: (a) The patient receiving the services; (b) Another health care professional with whom the provider of the services is consulting regarding the patient. (B) Each health care professional licensing board shall permit a health care professional under its jurisdiction to provide the professional's services as telehealth services in accordance with this section. The board may adopt any rules it considers necessary to implement this section. The rules shall be adopted in accordance with Chapter 119 of the Revised Code. (C) With respect to the provision of telehealth services, all of the following apply: (1) A health care professional may use synchronous or asynchronous technology to provide telehealth services to a patient during an initial visit if the appropriate standard of care for an initial visit is satisfied. ... (a) The professional may provide telehealth services to a patient located outside of this state if permitted by the laws of the state in which the patient is located. (b) The professional may provide telehealth services through the use of medical devices that enable remote monitoring, including such activities as monitoring a patient's blood pressure, heart rate, or glucose level.

- HB 130 is in the House State and Local Government Committee. It is to allow a police department to fill a vacant position in the classified civil service without a competitive examination.
- HB 166 is in the House Criminal Justice Committee. It is to modify the criminal sentencing law with respect to non-life felony indefinite sentencing.
- HB 172 is in the Senate Veterans and Public Safety Committee. It is to revise the fireworks law.
  - Same as SB 113 was vetoed by the governor on July 9, 2021. It was to revise the Fireworks Law. The Senate has the option to start the override process.
- HB 176 is in the Senate Health. It is to revise the law governing the practice of athletic training and to amend the version of section 4755.6 of the ORC that is scheduled to take effect on October 9, 2021, to continue the changes to that section on and after that date.
- HB 179 is in the House Families, Aging, and Human Services Committee. It is to modify
  the laws governing expedited licensure inspections and reviewing plans for long-term care
  facilities and license providers of home health services.
- HB 181 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to require a licensing



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authority to issue an occupational license to an applicant who completes a registered apprenticeship program and meets other requirements.

- HB 196 is in the House Health Committee. It is to regulate the practice of surgical assistants.
- HB 198 is in the House Health Committee. It is to require health plan issuers to cover hearing aids and related services for persons twenty-one years of age and younger and to designate these changes as Madeline's Law.
- HB 202 is in the House Government Oversight Committee. It is to void the order of the Interim Director of Health requiring the use of facial coverings throughout the state and prohibit the Governor or other administrative department heads from requiring the use of facial coverings without approval by the General Assembly.
- HB 203 is in the House State and Local Government Committee. It is to require an
  occupational licensing authority to issue a license or government certification to an
  applicant who holds a license, government certification, or private certification or has
  satisfactory work experience in another state under certain circumstances and to amend
  the version of section 3319.22 of the ORC that is scheduled to take effect on April 12, 2023,
  to continue the changes on and after that date.
  - Same as SB 131 and is in the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee.
- HB 215 is in the Senate Small Business & Economic Opportunity. It is to enact the Business Fairness Act and to declare an emergency.
- HB 218 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to temporarily extend bar hours of operation, exempt bars from statewide curfews, and declare an emergency.
- HB 221 is in the House Health Committee. It is to modify the laws governing the practice
  of advanced practice registered nurses and to designate these provisions as the Better,
  Access, Better Care Act.
- HB 231 is in the House Transportation and Public Safety Committee. It is to prohibit the Registrar of Motor Vehicles or the Motor Vehicle Dealers Board from adopting rules regarding the hours of operation of a used motor vehicle dealer as a condition of licensure.
- HB 232 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to enact the Ohio Equal Pay Act to address wage disparities in public and private employment.
- HB 235 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to enact the High Hazard Training Certification (HHTC) Act regarding construction services performed under a contract at a stationary source.
- HB 236 is in the House Health Committee. It is to regulate the processing, sale, and distribution of kratom.
- HB 243 is in the Government Oversight Committee. It is regarding the regulation of knives.
  - Same as SB 156 in the Senate Veterans and Public Safety Committee.
- HB 247 is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee. It is to amend the law related to plumbing inspections.
- HB 248 is in the House Health Committee. It is to authorize an individual to decline a vaccination and to name the act the Vaccine Choice and Anti-Discrimination Act.
- HB 277 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to revise regulations of



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#### cosmetologists and barbers.

- Same as SB 133 and is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee.
- HB 321 is in the House Agriculture and Conservation Committee. It is to eliminate the
  apprentice auctioneer and special auctioneer's license and to make other revision to the
  lase governing auctions.
- HB 350 is in the House Civil Justice Committee. It is to prohibit mandatory COVID-19 vaccinations, requiring proof of COVID-19 vaccination, and certain other actions relating to an individual's COVID-19 vaccination or health status and to declare an emergency.
  - Same as SB 169 and is in the Senate Health Committee.
- HB 359 is in the House Primary and Secondary Education Committee. It is to license and regulate art therapists and music therapists.
  - Same as SB 206 and has been introduced in the Senate.
- HB 372 has been introduced in the House. It is to make changes to the law relating to building inspections.
  - Same as SB196 and is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee.
- SB 9 is in the House Government Oversight Committee. It is to require certain agencies to reduce the number of regulatory restrictions in their administrative rules.
- SB 48 is in the Senate Health Committee. It is to require certain health care professionals to complete instruction in cultural competency.
- SB 66 is in the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee. It is to establish a career pathways apprentice program.
- SB 68 is in the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee. It is to prohibit private
  employers from including on an employment application any question concerning whether
  an applicant has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to a felony.
- SB 70 is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee. It is to prohibit employers from seeking a prospective employee's wage or salary history.
- SB 78 is in the Senate Government Oversight and Reform Committee. It is to establish the nineteenth of June as Juneteenth, a legal holiday for which government employees receive paid leave. PASSED AS A NATIONAL HOLIDAY.
- SB 129 is in the Senate Health Committee. It is to prohibit a hospital from requiring a nurse to work overtime as a condition of continued employment.
- SB 142 is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee. It is to license residential only construction contractors and to make changes to the law regulating specialty construction contractors.
- SB 150 is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee. It is to prohibit the use of noncompete provisions in physician employment contracts.
- SB 152 is in the Senate Finance Committee. It is to establish the Fraud, Waste and Abuse Task Force in the office of the Attorney General and to make an appropriation.
- SB 160 is in the Senate Veterans and Public Safety Committee. It is to enact the Veteran Information Act.



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- SB 189 is in the Senate Judiciary Committee. It is to change the venue in which an appeal from an agency order is proper to the local court of common pleas.
- SB 204 has been introduced in the Senate. It is to enter the Counseling Compact.

- Renewals occurred until July 1, 2021 for the 2021 licensure year. Some reinstatements have already occurred for the 2021 licensure year. The remaining renewals include 3 optometrists, 85 Ohio opticians and 14 outside of Ohio opticians, which the staff is following up on. There are 1,149 apprentices that have not renewed. Thanks to the associations for their assistance in June in contacting licensees to renew.
- The Rules Committee will meet today at 1:00 p.m.
- The August quarterly VPB eNewsletter will be emailed to all stakeholders in August. All other eNewsletters are available on the website.
- Attended virtual ARBO Executive Director's monthly meetings.
- Attended virtual Healthcare Executive Director's meetings with the Governor's office.
- Attended virtual Healthcare Executive Director's meetings as to a continuation of the Governor's Working Group on sexual assault and abuse with the development of the best investigative practices for the boards.
- Attended Healthcare Executive Director's meeting with the Governor's office on telehealth.
- Working on the transition of a new state storage migration for the VPB.
- Working on creating the VPB website on the new platform. Estimate live date is in the fall.
- Staff has been teleworking since March 16, 2020. A hybrid return to work will occur in the fall.

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#### FINANCIAL REPORT:

Director Anielski presented the financial report from the SFY 2021. After discussion Mark A. Gibson moved to accept the SFY 2021 Financial Report of the Ohio Vision Professionals Board. Dr. Darrell Dye, OD seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken by Thomas Barracato. The motion passed unanimously.

Dr. Thomas Nye inquired about the amount of people that come into the board offices on an average basis. This was due to the discussion of how the board was under budget in SFY 2021. It was brought up that less than 10 visitors per year come into the VPB offices and that the director is working on a hybrid model to return to the offices.

#### **Annual Continuing Education Requirements for Optometrist:**

A roll call vote was taken by Thomas Barracato. The motion passed, with Dr. Davis being absent during the vote.

The mission of the ACOE is to establish, maintain and apply standards to ensure the academic quality and continuous improvement of optometric education. The ACOE oversees professional optometric degree programs, optometric residency programs, and optometric technician programs.

On November 2, 2021, I attended an ACOE consultant training session in Boston. Simulations of program site visits were reviewed and evaluated, giving us insights into the rigorous assessment process.

#### EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT November 18, 2021 Board Meeting Marlene Anielski

#### **LEGISLATION:**

#### **Enacted:**

- HB 263 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> General Assembly (GA) became effective April 12, 2021. It revises occupational licensing restrictions applicable to individuals convicted of criminal offenses. The bill would enact the "Fresh Start Act of 2019." Requires within 180 days, October 9, 2021, after the bill's effective date, a list of criminal offenses be adopted for which a conviction disqualifies licensure. The bill applies to every profession or occupation for which a license issued or conferred by a state licensing authority is required. Exempt occupations only include peace officer basic training certificates. An annual report is required for the director of administrative services with information about the number of accepted and denied applications and a listing of criminal offenses of individuals approved and denied licenses. The first report was due October 4, 2021 and included the required information from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2020.
- HB 352 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> GA became effective April 15, 2021. It modifies civil rights laws relating to employment.
- HB 404 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> GA became effective November 22, 2020. It is to continue essential
  operations of virtual meetings of state and local governments in response to the declared
  pandemic and global health emergency related to COVID 19 until July 1, 2021. An
  amendment was added to extend certain agency license deadlines until July 1, 2021.
- SB 178 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> GA became effective March 2, 2021. It is regarding the authority of podiatrists to administer influenza vaccinations.
- SB 331 from the 133<sup>rd</sup> GA became effective April 12, 2021. It is to implement the recommendations of the Sunset Review Committee, comprised of senators and representative, by terminating or renewing various agencies four years more or less after the effective date of the act that established the agency. The VPB may be reviewed in the first year of the 134<sup>th</sup> GA, which is the year 2021. It requires a Sunset Review Committee to be convened during each General Assembly.
- HB 5 becomes effective September 28, 2021. It is to modify the requirements that
  may be met for licensure as a chemical dependency counselor II and to modify the
  professionals who may supervise certain individuals providing prevention services.
- HB 6 became effective May 14, 2021. It is to modify the laws governing certain health professionals and educator programs due to COVID-19 and other circumstances; to amend the version of section 4729.92 of the ORC that is scheduled to take effect on October 9, 2021, to continue the changes to that section on and after that date; and to declare an emergency.
- HB 21 becomes effective October 1, 2022. It is to increase the annual contribution for the "Donate Life" license plate and a voluntary \$2 contribution to the Second Change Trust Fund and to provide additional opportunities for Ohio residents to register as an organ donor.

- HB 172 is effective February 8, 2022. It is to revise the fireworks law.
  - Same as SB 113 was vetoed by the governor on July 9, 2021. It was to revise the Fireworks Law. The Senate had the option to start the override process, but did not.
- HB 176 effective January 27, 2022. It is to revise the law governing the practice of athletic training and to amend the version of section 4755.6 of the ORC that is scheduled to take effect on October 9, 2021, to continue the changes to that section on and after that date.
- HB 252 becomes effective September 28, 2021. It is to enter into the Audiology / Speech-Language Pathology Interstate Compact.
- SB 2 became effective August 3, 2021. It is to enter into the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact (PSYPACT) and make changes to the requirement for competency evaluation and mental health treatment in criminal cases.
- SB 3 becomes effective September 28, 2021. It is to enter into the Nurse Licensure Compact and to revise the law governing occupational license restrictions for individuals convicted of criminal offenses.
- SB 5 became effective June 29, 2021. It is to enter into the Physical Therapy Licensure Compact.
- SB 6 becomes effective September 28, 2021. It is to enter into the Interstate Medical
  Licensure Compact and to revise the law governing nurse aide training and competency
  evaluation programs, and to make an appropriation.
- SB 7 became effective June 29, 2021. It is to enter into the Occupational Therapy Licensure Compact.

#### **Current 134th General Assembly Bills:**

- HB 43 is in the House Government Oversight Committee. It is to authorize public bodies to meet via teleconference and video conference.
- HB 52 was withdrawn on February 5, 2021. It is to allow municipalities, townships, and counties to establish minimum wage requirements higher than the state minimum wage.
  - Same as SB 51 and is in the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee.
- HB 69 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to increase the state minimum wage.
- HB 81 is in the Senate Health Committee. It is to make changes to the laws governing massage establishments and massage therapy.
  - Same as SB 55 and has been reported out of the Senate Health Committee.
- HB 88 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to require commercial roofing contractors to have a license.
  - Same as SB 64 and is in the Senate Government Oversight and Reform Committee.
- HB 103 is in the House State and Local Government Committee. It is regarding the adoption and duration of emergency administrative rules.
- Sub HB 122 is in the Senate Health Committee. A substitute bill was accepted on November 10, 2021. It is regarding the provision of telehealth services. Sec. 4725.35.
   An optometrist who holds a therapeutic pharmaceutical agents certificate issued under this chapter may provide telehealth services in accordance with section 4743.09 of the Revised

Code. . . . 4743.09. (A) As used in this section: (1) "Durable medical equipment" means a type of equipment, such as a remote monitoring device utilized by a physician, . . that can withstand repeated use, is primarily and customarily used to serve a medical purpose, . . . includes repair and replacement parts for the equipment. . . . (3) "Health care professional" means: . . . (b) An optometrist licensed under Chapter 4725. of the Revised Code to practice optometry under a therapeutic pharmaceutical agents certificate; . . . (4) "Health care professional licensing board" means any of the following: . . . (b) The state vision professionals board; . . . (6) "Telemedicine Telehealth services" has the same meaning as in section 3902.30 of the Revised Code means health care services provided through the use of information and communication technology by a health care professional, within the professional's scope of practice, who is located at a site other than the site where either of the following is located: (a) The patient receiving the services: (b) Another health care professional with whom the provider of the services is consulting regarding the patient. (B) Each health care professional licensing board shall permit a health care professional under its jurisdiction to provide the professional's services as telehealth services in accordance with this section. The board may adopt any rules it considers necessary to implement this section. The rules shall be adopted in accordance with Chapter 119 of the Revised Code. (C) With respect to the provision of telehealth services, all of the following apply: (1) A health care professional may use synchronous or asynchronous technology to provide telehealth services to a patient during an initial visit if the appropriate standard of care for an initial visit is satisfied. . . . (a) The professional may provide telehealth services to a patient located outside of this state if permitted by the laws of the state in which the patient is located. (b) The professional may provide telehealth services through the use of medical devices that enable remote monitoring, including such activities as monitoring a patient's blood pressure, heart rate, or glucose level.

- HB 130 is in the House State and Local Government Committee. It is to allow a police department to fill a vacant position in the classified civil service without a competitive examination.
- HB 153 is in the House Insurance Committee. It is regarding prescription drugs and medication switching.
- HB 166 is in the House Criminal Justice Committee. It is to modify the criminal sentencing law with respect to non-life felony indefinite sentencing.
- HB 179 is in the House Families, Aging and Human Services Committee. It is to modify
  the laws governing expedited licensure inspections and reviewing plans for long-term care
  facilities and license providers of home health services.
- HB 181 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to require a licensing authority to issue an occupational license to an applicant who completes a registered apprenticeship program and meets other requirements.
- HB 193 is in the Senate Health Committee. It is in regards to electronic prescriptions
- for schedule II-controlled substances.
- HB 196 is in the House Health Committee. It is to regulate the practice of surgical

- HB 198 is in the House Health Committee. It is to require health plan issuers to cover hearing aids and related services for persons twenty-one years of age and younger and to designate these changes as Madeline's Law.
- HB 202 is in the House Government Oversight Committee. It is to void the order of the Interim Director of Health requiring the use of facial coverings throughout the state and prohibit the Governor or other administrative department heads from requiring the use of facial coverings without approval by the General Assembly.
- HB 203 is in the House State and Local Government Committee. It is to require an
  occupational licensing authority to issue a license or government certification to an
  applicant who holds a license, government certification, or private certification or has
  satisfactory work experience in another state under certain circumstances and to amend
  the version of section 3319.22 of the ORC that is scheduled to take effect on April 12, 2023,
  to continue the changes on and after that date.
  - Same as SB 131 and is in the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee.
- HB 215 is in the Senate Small Business & Economic Opportunity. It is to enact the Business Fairness Act and to declare an emergency.
  - Same as SB 119 and is in the Senate Government Oversight and Reform Committee.
- HB 218 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to temporarily extend bar hours of operation, exempt bars from statewide curfews, and declare an emergency.
- HB 221 is in the House Health Committee. It is to modify the laws governing the practice
  of advanced practice registered nurses and to designate these provisions as the Better,
  Access, Better Care Act.
- HB 231 is in the House Transportation and Public Safety Committee. It is to prohibit the Registrar of Motor Vehicles or the Motor Vehicle Dealers Board from adopting rules regarding the hours of operation of a used motor vehicle dealer as a condition of licensure.
- HB 232 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to enact the Ohio Equal Pay Act to address wage disparities in public and private employment.
- HB 235 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to enact the High Hazard Training Certification (HHTC) Act regarding construction services performed under a contract at a stationary source.
- HB 236 is in the House Health Committee. It is to regulate the processing, sale, and distribution of kratom.
- HB 243 is in the House Government Oversight Committee. It is regarding the regulation of knives.
  - Same as SB 156 and is in the House Government Oversight Committee.
- HB 247 is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee. It is to amend the law related to plumbing inspections.
- HB 248 is in the House Health Committee. It is to authorize an individual to decline a vaccination and to name the act the Vaccine Choice and Anti-Discrimination Act.
- HB 277 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to revise regulations of cosmetologists and barbers.

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- Same as SB 133 and is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee.
- HB 318 is in the House Health Committee. It is to revise the laws governing anesthesiologist assistants.
- HB 321 is in the House Agriculture and Conservation Committee. It is to eliminate the
  apprentice auctioneer and special auctioneer's license and to make other revision to the
  lase governing auctions.
- HB 350 is in the House Civil Justice Committee. It is to prohibit mandatory COVID-19 vaccinations, requiring proof of COVID-19 vaccination, and certain other actions relating to an individual's COVID-19 vaccination or health status and to declare an emergency.
  - Same as SB 169 and is in the Senate Health Committee.
- HB 359 is in the State and Local Government Committee. It is to license and regulate art therapists and music therapists.
  - Same as SB 206 and is the Senate Health Committee.
- HB 372 is in the House Commerce and Labor Committee. It is to make changes to the law relating to building inspections.
  - Same as SB196 and is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee.
- HB 448 is in the House Insurance. It is in regards for prescription drug readers for visually impaired patients.
- HB 452 is in the House State and Local Government Committee. It is in regards for the chemical dependency professional regulations.
- SB 9 is in the House Government Oversight Committee. It is to require certain agencies to reduce the number of regulatory restrictions in their administrative rules.
- SB 48 is in the Senate Health Committee. It is to require certain health care professionals to complete instruction in cultural competency.
- SB 66 is in the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee. It is to establish a career pathways apprentice program.
- SB 68 is in the Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committee. It is to prohibit private
  employers from including on an employment application any question concerning whether
  an applicant has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to a felony.
- SB 70 is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee. It is to prohibit employers from seeking a prospective employee's wage or salary history.
- SB 78 is in the Senate Government Oversight and Reform Committee. It is to establish the nineteenth of June as Juneteenth, a legal holiday for which government employees receive paid leave. PASSED AS A NATIONAL HOLIDAY.
- SB 129 is in the Senate Health Committee. It is to prohibit a hospital from requiring a nurse to work overtime as a condition of continued employment.
- SB 142 is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee. It is to license residential only construction contractors and to make changes to the law regulating specialty construction contractors.
- SB 150 is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee. It is to prohibit the use of noncompete provisions in physician employment contracts.

- SB 152 is in the Senate Finance Committee. It is to establish the Fraud, Waste and Abuse Task Force in the office of the Attorney General and to make an appropriation.
- SB 160 is in the House Armed Services and Veterans Affairs Committee. It is to enact the Veteran Information Act.
- SB 189 is in the Senate Judiciary Committee. It is to change the venue in which an appeal from an agency order is proper to the local court of common pleas.
- SB 204 has been referred to the House. It is to enter the Counseling Compact.
- SB 224 is in the Senate General Government Budget Committee. It is to revise the law regarding funerals and funeral services.
- SB 233 is in the Senate Primary and Secondary Education Committee. It is in regards to school nurse licensure and state retirement.
- SB 242 is in the Senate Small Business and Economic Opportunity Committee. It would require retail merchants to accept customer payment by cash.
- SB 245 is in the Senate Health Committee. It would modify supervised professional experience for psychologists.

- For the past 3 months I have been assisting Investigator Price and Director Anielski with investigations stemming from recent complaints and assisting with the drafting of administrative rules.






# 2021 Quarterly Complaints by Status Level (16 total complaints)


**Moderate**- Review by board member and AAG, closed in a timely manner after minimal investigation.

- 4. Display of names of unlicensed or retired Optometrist on practice websites.
- 5. Apprentices working without the direct supervisor present.

# **Investigator Activities**

## **VPB Investigator's Non-Compliance Inspections**

1. An optometrist office located in Bryan, where one ancillary personnel was advertising themselves as a licensed optician was discovered by the Vision Professionals Board (VPB) Investigator. The ancillary personnel stated they had been previously licensed in Indiana and was not licensed in Ohio. During the routine inspection, the VPB Investigator discovered that the licensees' certificates were not properly displayed, expired agents were present and expired contacts were still within the dispensary. The approximate total number of expired contacts found were to be in the 1000's which was significant. The VPB Investigator contacted Executive Director Marlene Anielski for further guidance. The VPB Investigator was directed to collect all expired contacts and agents, photograph them, and bring them to the VPB office for storage. The VPB Investigator returned to the office and was advised the owner was enroute to the practice. The owner arrived and was immediately confrontational. The VPB Investigator explained the circumstances and cited the Laws and Rules of having licensed personnel dispense optical aids. The owner attempted to explain the expired contacts but could not justify the excessive amount. The VPB Investigator advised that the contacts would be removed and taken to the VPB office. The owner was asked to escort the VPB Investigator to the screening and examination rooms. All equipment and stations appeared to be clean and in good working order. The owner was instructed to mount all licenses in an inconspicuous place for the public to see when entering the practice. The owner complied immediately.

The ancillary person was directed to call the VPB office and start the process of becoming an apprentice, until such time that they meet all requirements to become fully licensed. Immediately, the ancillary person went to the phone and called the VPB office. The VPB Investigator provided a printed version of the Rules already explained. The Inspection was concluded, and all expired contacts and agents were collected.

2. An optician office located in Maumee, where a combined inspection was conducted by the Vision Professionals Board (VPB) Executive Director (ED) and Investigator was conducted. The Inspection was prompted by an anonymous letter sent to the VPB inbox by persons concerned with the practice in Maumee dispensing without licenses. During the inspection, The ED and Investigator found the allegations to be untrue. The personnel working at the location were found in violation of not having name

tags, cluttered storage area, and expired contact lens solution at the wash station. The solution was emptied by the ED and collected. The staff were educated on the Laws and Rules. The Investigators business card was handed to the lead optician, and the inspection was concluded.

## 2021 Prevent Blindness Ohio Campaign

For history, in 2020, two (2) establishments were found selling illegal contact lenses. In 2021, a total nine (9) establishments were visited. All nine (9) of which were found selling illegal cosmetic contact lenses. In addition, a press release in cooperation with Ohio Attorney General Dave Yost, Prevent Blindness, and the Ohio Vision Professionals Board (VPB) was released on October 12th, 2021. The press release reiterated in preventing blindness, Ohioans should avoid any purchases of illegal cosmetic contact lenses.

The nine (9) total locations in Ohio identified between the months of April 2021 and October 2021 in selling illegal contacts were in the following counties: one (1) in Butler County, one (1) in Summit County, one (1) in Richland County, and six (6) in Cuyahoga County.

Each location was visited by a member of the Vision Professionals Board staff. A Cease-and-Desist order was prepared and issued to the establishments management team, along with a copy of the press release. Follow up phone calls were made to the establishments by the Vision Professionals Board Investigator. Pricing for the cosmetic/decorative contact lenses ranged from \$16.19 to \$26.99. Tax was included in the prices.

Additionally, each store was then checked against the Secretary of State (SoS) business website search. Those stores identified as not being registered with the SoS website was passed along to Allison DeSantis, Secretary of State personnel on 11-5-2021. Allison DeSantis is looking into those stores as to why they are not registered.

All illegal contact evidence is stored at the Vision Professionals Board Investigators office.

# **Administrative Code Update**

4725-3-08

Requirements for licensure by endorsement, <u>optometrist</u>, dispensing optician or ocularist educated outside the United States of America.

The board will recognize for licensure by endorsement any optometrist meeting the requirements of section 4725.18 of the Revised Code who has an active license in good standing issued by another state board of optometry or a province in Canada.

The applicant for licensure by endorsement must meet the qualifications as set forth in divisions (A) and (B)(1) to (B)(4) of section 4725.12 of the Revised Code. The applicant must provide proof of being in an active practice of optometry including the use of therapeutic pharmaceutical agents, for at least three years immediately preceding the application. The board may require that the applicant pass all or part of the licensing examination accepted by the board under section 4725.11 of the Revised Code if the board determines that testing is necessary to determine the applicants qualifications for issuance of a certificate of licensure and therapeutic pharmaceutical agents certificate under this paragraph.

If the applicant has not been involved in an active practice of optometry for the past three years the board may require additional testing as deemed necessary. The minimum requirement for such non-practicing applicants to be granted licensure by endorsement would be passing scores in the clinical skills section of the examination given by the national board of examiners in optometry or any equivalent examination as determined by the board.

Applicants licensed after May 19, 1992 must have passed the testing requirements of the national board of examiners in optometry as stated in the Ohio law. Applicants licensed prior to May 19, 1992 must have passed the national board of examiners in optometry examinations or a state test equivalent to the Ohio examination at the time the applicant was licensed in that state.

#### (A) Optometrists:

- (1) The board will recognize for licensure by endorsement any optometrist meeting the requirements of section 4725.18 of the Revised Code who has an active license in good standing issued by another state board of optometry or a province in Canada.
- (2) The applicant for licensure by endorsement must meet the qualifications as set forth in divisions (A) and (B)(1) to (B)(4) of section 4725.12 of the Revised Code. The applicant must provide proof of being in an active practice of optometry including the use of therapeutic pharmaceutical agents, for at least three years immediately preceding the application. The board may require that the applicant pass all or part of the licensing examination accepted by the board under section 4725.11 of the Revised Code if the board determines that testing is necessary to determine the applicants qualifications for issuance of a certificate of licensure and therapeutic pharmaceutical agents certificate

#### under this paragraph.

- (3) If the applicant has not been involved in an active practice of optometry for the past three years the board may require additional testing as deemed necessary. The minimum requirement for such non-practicing applicants to be granted licensure by endorsement would be passing scores in the clinical skills section of the examination given by the national board of examiners in optometry or any equivalent examination as determined by the board.
- (4) Applicants licensed after May 19, 1992 must have passed the testing requirements of the national board of examiners in optometry as stated in the Ohio law. Applicants licensed prior to May 19, 1992 must have passed the national board of examiners in optometry examinations or a state test equivalent to the Ohio examination at the time the applicant was licensed in that state.
- (5) The board may require copies of all testing given by the state or province from the state board or province in which the applicant was initially examined to determine that the tet was equivalent to the Ohio examiniation at the time the applicant was licensed in that state or province.

The board may require copies of all testing given by the state or province from the state board or province in which the applicant was initially examined to determine that the test was equivalent to the Ohio examination at the time the applicant was licensed in that state or province.

- (B) All applications for initial licensure as a dispensing optician or ocularist in Ohio by endorsement shall be submitted to the board in a form designated by the board. Opticians and ocularists:
  - (1) All applications for initial licensure as a dispensing optician or ocularist in Ohio by endorsement shall be submitted to the board in a form designated by the board.

#### (C)(2) Applications shall be:

- (1)(a) Accompanied by the fee in a form established by the board; and,
- (2)(b) Accompanied by such evidence, statement, or documents as specified on the application form, including but not limited to:
  - (a)(i) Verification of licensure in good standing received directly from the state of the current licensure or registration at the time of application; and,

- (b)(ii) Shall submit to criminal records check completed by the bureau of criminal identification and investigation in accordance with section 4725.501 of the Revised Code. The results of the criminal records check shall be received by the board prior to the issuance of a license to practice as a dispensing optician. In accordance with this rule, the applicant requesting the criminal records check shall:
  - (i)(a) Provide the bureau of criminal identification and investigation with the applicant's name and address and with the name and address for the Ohio vision professionals board; and,
  - (ii)(b) Cause a records check to be conducted with the federal bureau of investigation regarding applicant.
- (3)(c) The board will only accept the results of a criminal records check that is submitted to the board directly by the bureau of criminal identification and investigation.
- (D)(3) An applicant for initial licensure by endorsement as a dispensing optician shall:
  - (1)(a) Be at least eighteen years of age;
  - (2)(b) Be of good moral character; honest and trustworthy;
  - (3)(c) Be a graduate of a secondary school recognized by the state department of education in this state, or similar educational agency in another state or has attained an educational equivalent such as proof of having successfully passed the general educational development (GED) examination or a GED certificate of high school equivalency diploma.
  - (4)(d) Have successfully completed either of the following:
    - (a)(i) A two-year college level program in optical dispensing approved by the board that includes, but is not limited to, courses of study in:
      - (i)(a) Mathematics;

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(ii)(b) Science;

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(iii)(c) English;
      \frac{\text{(iv)}(d)}{d} Anatomy and physiology of the eye;
      (v)(e) Applied optics;
      (vi)(f) Measurement and inspection of lenses, lens grinding and

      (x)(i) Fitting and adjusting of spectacle lenses, frames and contact

(b)(ii) Two years of supervised experience of at least one thousand
      hours per year in optical dispensing as a registered apprentice
      under the direct supervision of a licensed optician; or,
(e)(iii) Two years of supervised experience as an employee and under
      the direct supervision of an optometrist or physician engaged in
      the practice of ophthalmology.
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(5)(e) The applicant has successfully completed the state board national qualifying examination for either the spectacle dispensing license, the contact lens dispensing license or combination of both examinations for a spectacle-contact lens dispensing license.

(d)(iv) Not more than one year of such experience may be continuous, supervised optical laboratory experience of not less than thirty

(E)(4) If an application for licensure by endorsement submitted to the board remains incomplete for one year, the application shall be considered void.

- (F)(5) The appropriate license and wall certificate shall be issued by the board no later than sixty days after approval by the board.
- (G)(6) All applications for licensure as an optician or ocularist, educated outside the United States of America, shall be submitted to the board on the appropriate application as designated by the board.

#### (H)(7) Applications shall be:

- (1)(a) Accompanied by a non-refundable fee in a form established by the board and as prescribed in division (B) of section 4725.48 of the Revised Code; and,
- (2)(b) Accompanied by such evidence, statements or documents as specified on the application form including but not limited to:
  - (a)(i) An official transcript in English from the education program submitted to the board directly by the program administrator or designee that includes information sufficient for the board to determine whether the program has educational content and requirements that are substantially similar to those set forth in rule 4725-3-01 of the Administrative Code; or,
  - (b)(ii) Evidence satisfactory to the board of completion of an apprentice program that meets the requirements of section 4725.48 of the Revised Code.
  - (e)(iii) Evidence satisfactory to the board that the applicant has successfully completed the appropriate state board national qualifying examination for the license sought.
- (1)(8) An applicant for licensure as a dispensing optician or ocularist, educated outside the United States of America shall:
  - (1)(a) Be at least eighteen years of age;
  - (2)(b) Be of good moral character; honest and trustworthy;
  - (3)(c) Be a graduate of a secondary school substantially similar to a high school equivalency diploma.

- (4)(d) For a license as a dispensing optician, have completed the requirements as established in rule 4725-3-01 of the Administrative Code.
- (5)(e) For a license as an ocularist, have completed the requirements as established in rule 4725-3-01 of the Administrative Code.
- (J)(9) In addition to the requirements of this rule, all optician and ocularist applicants for licensure under this section, shall submit to criminal records checks completed by the bureau of criminal identification and investigation in accordance with section 4725.501 of the Revised Code.
- (K)(10) If an application for licensure, under this section, by an optician or ocularist that is submitted to the board remains incomplete for one year, the application shall be considered void.
- (L)(11) The appropriate license and wall certificate shall be issued by the board no later than sixty days after approval by the board

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#### **COPE Announces Transition Period for Interactive Online CE**

10/29/2021

In response to travel restrictions and many states adopting emergency orders related to COVID-19 in 2020, COPE temporarily modified its format policy to allow COPE Administrators and Accredited Providers to give "live" credit for CE courses that were presented in an interactive distance learning format (i.e. live webinar.) Since in-person CE is resuming and state emergency orders have expired, this temporary policy modification is ending 12/31/2021 and "live" COPE CE will require both learners and instructors to be physically present in the same room.

Although the temporary live policy modification is ending, COPE will not be reverting back to all original format policies in 2022. The COPE Governing Committee is working on a proposal for permanent changes to COPE's format requirements in response to the ever-changing CE landscape and learning technology. The period of 1/1/2022-6/30/2022 will be a transition period for the COPE Governing Committee to complete research, develop a proposal, and collect stakeholder feedback on proposed format changes. During this 6-month transition period, post-course tests will NOT be required for COPE Accredited INTERACTIVE DISTANCE LEARNING courses/activities.

In order to be considered INTERACTIVE Distance Learning by COPE, a course must have synchronous learning (the learners and the instructor(s) attend together at the same time). Attendees must be able to have immediate interaction with the instructor (i.e. live webinar). The activity can only be presented at one specified time, and once it has taken place, the learners may no longer participate in that activity. CE Providers must have a way to confirm the learners' attendance for every course before issuing certificates of attendance. The post-course test will not be required during the transition period, as mentioned in the above paragraph.

Courses that are asynchronous learning and do not meet the requirements for interactivity above are considered by COPE to be ENDURING DISTANCE LEARNING courses. Recorded webinars are an example of ENDURING Distance Learning activities where there is no immediate interaction with the instructor and participants can choose when to participate. During the transition period, ENDURING DISTANCE LEARNING courses will still be required to have a post-course test that has been reviewed by a school of optometry, medicine, pharmacy or osteopathy.

COPE feels that the quality of education is more important than the location of the course. COPE Accreditation is based on developing CE activities around optometrist's educational needs and professional practice gaps in conjunction with assessing outcomes and applying quality improvement measures. Continuing education delivery methods changed during the COVID-19 pandemic and technology now allows for immediate interaction with a course instructor regardless of learners being present in the same room. During the pandemic, optometrists were still able to participate in COPE Accredited CE activities, and many of them reported that they learned just as much, or more, in a virtual environment than they previously did in a face-to-face environment. However, CE requirements for license renewal are set by the Optometric State and Provincial Licensing Boards, and many of these boards still limit the number of online hours that will apply for license renewal regardless of whether the CE activity is interactive.

Please note that although COPE's policy is being modified during the transition period to not require a post-course test for INTERACTIVE DISTANCE LEARNING courses, individual State and Provincial Licensing Boards may have different rules. COPE advises optometrists to contact the State or Provincial Board where they are licensed for verification of what is acceptable for license renewal. # 4725.04 Organization of board.

The state vision professionals board shall organize by the election of a president and a secretary from its members, who shall hold their respective offices for one year.

The board shall hold meetings to perform its regular duties at least four times each year. At least one of the board's regular meetings shall be held in Franklin county. The board may hold additional meetings as it considers necessary. The time and place of any regular or other meeting shall be fixed and published by the board at least thirty days prior to the date that it is to be held, except when the meeting to be held is an emergency or special meeting, in which case the board shall give twenty-four hours' notice or as much notice as possible under the circumstances.

A majority of the board constitutes a quorum .
